Road No 62—changed to read as follows: Commencing at the S W corner of Sec 36 Tp 17 S R 6 W, thence north 3 miles, thence east 1/2 mile, thence north 1/2 mile to the center of Sec 13 Tp 17 S R 6 W; thence east to Coyote creek in Sec 16 Tp 17 S R 5 W; thence southerly up Coyote creek to a point 10 chains north to the township line between townships 17 and 18 S; thence west to the west line of Sec 34, Tp 17 S R 5 W; thence north 30 chains, thence west 1/2 mile, thence south 1/2 mile, thence west 3/4 miles to the place of beginning.

SEVERAL GRAFTS
A Large Lobby With Lots of Money at Work.

THE STAND IN.

SALEM, Or, Feb 2.—This week the lobbies at the state capitol are crowded with those who are directly interested in using their influence for the benefit of pet schemes.

Physicians of the so-called "regular" school, are very active in their endeavors to push through the medical bill, which is nothing more nor less than a measure, going their particular branch of practice, a monopoly in the practice of medicine, and compelling all others to discontinue business.

Another measure, which is also being kindly favored by the "push," is that relating to the refunding of county indebtedness. In fact it is quite evident that a very "tangibile" influence is present and its object is to prevent a defeat of the proposed law. The measure is undoubtedly in the interests of Whitehead and other capitalists who believe in keeping a yoke of indebtedness upon the people, so that should a wave of prosperity strike them, in place of paying off their warrants, only interest can be paid, and when, at the end of 20 or 30 years, should there be a drop in money matters, another lot of bonds could be folded on the taxpayers, thus making their hold on the people, stronger and stronger.

Other bills which are in the interests of corporations and private individuals are the beet sugar bounty bill and one relating to the purchase of a new site for the deaf-mute school. The former has been pretty thoroughly aired through the columns of the press, but the latter has not as yet been given much notice.

SOLDIER'S HOME

Byars Exonerated and Highly Praised.

OTHER WORK.
SALEM, Feb 2.—At the special session a joint committee was appointed to investigate the soldier's home at Roseburg. It reported today. The report says the committee made a full examination. It exonerated ex-Commandant Byars and praised his management highly. It was recommended that the law providing for a board of trustees be repealed, leaving all provisions for the home in the Governor's hands, and that certain rules relating to turning pensions over to the home be modified. Also reported a bill on the subject.

The senate passed the direct legislation resolution.
Representative Carter's, of Astoria, bill amending law protecting salmon passed the house today.

Senator Driver's bill providing that convicts shall labor on public highway was passed in the senate this forenoon. The Woodburn charter bill, after being reconsidered passed the house.

The Cold Snap.
This morning at 5 o'clock the thermometer in Eugene registered 9 degrees above zero. It looks like another cold night. The snow is about two inches deep.

Junction City, Feb. 1.—There were about two inches of wet snow on the ground early this morning, about 2 o'clock p m, the wind shifted to the north and there came a regular blizzard of frozen snow, the temperature falling 10 degrees in less than ten minutes. The snow is now about six inches deep.

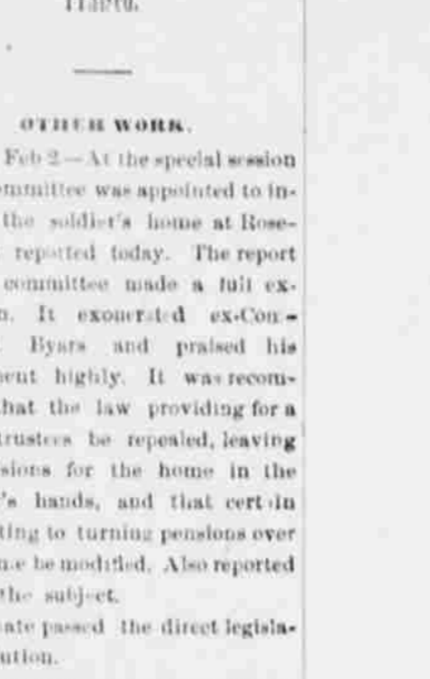

MISS TEMPLETON'S RELIEF BILL.—Albany Democrat: If there is any special bill that should be passed it is the one granting \$5,000 for Ivy Templeton on account of damages received by going through a bridge in this county in 1890, resulting in the loss of a limb, so that she is now obliged to walk with crutches. Under the laws of the state at that time the county was not responsible. Miss Templeton has been crippled for life and it would be only a matter of justice that she receive compensation which can only in a measure satisfy the great loss. The state which is granting thousands for special purposes should not stop with a matter like this that excites the sympathy of everyone familiar with it.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE.
Mrs Dunway Talked Sweetly and Members Voted With Fear.
After slipping the Woman's suffrage amendment quietly through the senate, Mrs Dunway worked the House in an equally effective manner. Immediately after roll call at the evening session senate joint resolution No 7, for a constitutional amendment giving the suffrage to women was considered. By unanimous consent, Mrs Abigail Scott Dunway of Portland addressed the house in advocacy of the measure. Mrs Dunway spoke very pleasantly and entertainingly for about ten minutes, being frequently interrupted by applause. One of her expressions which seemed to please the house was, "Gentlemen, we don't want to rule you. The man who would be ruled by his wife would not be worth corraling after she had driven him home." She expressed confidence that the members would do the square thing in this matter, and her confidence did not prove to be misplaced. On roll call Curtis explained that he did not favor woman suffrage, but did not wish to deprive the people a chance to vote on the question, therefore voted ay. Whalley went to considerable length to explain why he voted no.
