NEW GAME LAW

Protection Given to Oregon Birds and Game.

STRINGENT PROVISIONS.

The new game law makes it unlawful to kill deer between the first of November and the fifteenth of July; spotted fawn at any time; beaver at any time, and silver-grey squirrel between January 1st and October 1st; deer between one hour after sunset and one half hour before sunrise, and at no time unless the carcass be used or preserved for food; hunting deer with dogs is prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person or corporation to buy or offer to buy, or transport or carry for purposes of trade, sale, barter or exchange the skin, hide, horns, hams or other flesh of any deer, moose or mountain sheep.

QUAIL, GROUSE AND PHEASANTS.

It shall be unlawful at any time between the first day of December of each year and the first day of October of the following year, to take, kill, injure or destroy, or have in possession, except for breeding purposes, or sell or offer for sale, any grouse, prairie chickens, pheasant, Mongolian pheasant, quail or partridge. English partridges or wild turkeys cannot be killed between January 3rd, 1899, and February, 1904.

Reckless Extravagance of Legislature for Clerk Hire.

When it paid its chief clerk \$10 per day and several other clerks \$9.50 per day the house made a generous blunder says the Corvallis Times. The compensation is all out of proportion to the service rendered.

The rate is more than three times the pay of members, and in most markets brains come higher than clerical capacity. If members are willing to brave all the hazards and responsibilities of a legislative career for \$3 per day clerks should be considered well paid at \$5 per day for transacting the dangerous routine of a clerkship.

Died.

Daily Guard March 1. Abraham Landess another of the noble pioneers of Oregon passed quietly away at his home in this city, on High street, between Sixth and Seventh at 8 o'clock last evening. His death was expected.

He was one of the few surviving veterans of the Black Hawk war, was born in the Shenandoah valley, Virginia, April 14, 1809. He removed from his native state to Indiana, thence to Iowa, and in 1854 crossed the plains to Oregon, settling in Lane county, where he has since resided, with the exception of three or four years spent in the State of Washington. He enlisted in the Black Hawk war in 1835, and remained in the service until the close of the war. He was married in Indiana, about 1840, to Miss Amanda Level, who died in this county in 1868. In 1871 he married Sarah A. Pizer. Until about three years ago his memory was good and he was quite strong, but for some time he has been feeble.

He was the father of nine children: Mrs G W Ebbert and Mrs Sarah Davis, of Polk county; Mrs P J McPherson, of Eugene; Mrs R B Spencer, of Gilliam county; W H and W S Landess, of Idaho; Mrs J S Stevens and Mrs E A Ladow, of the State of Washington, and Z T Landess, of Edenville, California. The funeral will occur Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock from his late residence on High street to the Gillespie cemetery. Friends are respectfully invited to attend.

EUGENE DIVINITY SCHOOL

Successful Year for the Institution.— A Lecturer Coming.

CURRENT CLASS WORK.

February number University of Oregon Monthly: Work at the Eugene Divinity school is progressing satisfactorily. The enrollment this year has reached the quarter hundred limit. This is an increase of twenty over the enrollment of the fall term of 1895. The last dollar of indebtedness on the building and fixtures was paid late in 1898. As a neighbor to the E of O the future of the E D S is bright.

A number of valuable reference books have been added to the library this year. The E D S Oratorical Club has closed a contract with Rev Geo F Hall of Decatur, Ill, in which the famous orator and lecturer agrees to deliver his most striking lecture, "The Sacred New Woman," in this city early in the spring. The exact date has not been fixed.

The class in Sacred History has completed Genesis and Exodus. The study of the historical books of the Old Testament is taken up in connection with the general history of the world. The class is now wandering in the wilderness with the children of Israel. The same class has completed the Life of Christ and harmony of the Gospels, and is now studying the Acts exegetically. The advanced Exegesis class has completed Hebrews, and is now studying the First Corinthian letter. The Hebrew class is reading Genesis in its original form.
