RESUME OF WORK.

The government engineers say of the Siuslaw: "The amount expended to June 30, 1897, \$95,327.37, resulted in the construction of the north jetty receiving wharf, the construction of a railway trestle approach 3029 feet long, from the receiving wharf to the root of the north jetty, and the construction of 483 feet of the north jetty.

"The expenditures during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1898, resulted, in extending the north jetty for a distance of 428 feet, giving it a total length of 911 feet.

"Nothing has been done toward the construction of the south jetty, the project providing that the north jetty shall be constructed first.

"The depth on the bar has not been materially increased since the construction of the north jetty was begun, and no permanent improvement in that respect is anticipated in advance of the further extension of the north jetty.

"The maximum draft that may be carried June 30, 1898, at mean low tide over the shoalest part of the locality under improvement is 7 1/2 feet.

Grand Jury Selected--Bailiff Appointed to Serve, Etc.

A regular term of the circuit court of Lane county, Oregon, convened at the court house this forenoon at 9 o'clock.

Present, Judge J. W. Hamilton, of Roseburg, District Attorney Geo. M. Brown, of Roseburg, Sheriff W. W. Withers, of Thurston and County Clerk Lee, of Junction City.

THE MONROE COLONY.

An Interesting Interview With Mr. C. Hogue, One of the Promoters.

Daily Guard, March 7.

Today's Albany Herald: "A Herald reporter called on Mr. C. Hogue yesterday to ascertain the facts in regard to his membership in this colony. Mr. Hogue said he was interested in everything which would build up this part of the valley, but did not expect to give up his business interests in and near Albany. He said the colony is as yet in the future--that the land and other property in and near Monroe had been secured on a favorable option and that as soon as incorporated the work of organizing would proceed.

"It was not the intention of the promoter, Rev. Mr. Wallace, to boom the colony in any way--as both he and others interested preferred that the growth should be healthy rather than rapid.

"The colony is not to be Christian Scientist, but the church organization is a branch of the People's United Church founded in Spokane by Rev. Dr. McInturff.

"Mr. Hogue spoke hopeful of the prospects of the colony, saying that while there had been many failures in such experiments there had also been numerous decided successes. He claimed that the proportion of failures had not been greater in these colonies than in ordinary business enterprises, and that after a colony has passed the third year successfully its prosperity is usually assured. It is not necessary to be a member of the church to become a member of the colony."

KIPLING'S SORROW

Oldest Daughter of Rudyard Kipling Died of Pneumonia.

New York, March 6.--Josephine Kipling, the 6-year-old daughter of Rudyard Kipling, and the oldest of his three children, died this morning from pneumonia. The improvement of Kipling's condition continues.

HEP COP FOR 1899.

Hopbuyers are now offering at North Yakima to contract the '99 crop at 11 cents, which is the best price offered for years this early in the season.

Several contracts for hops of next season's crop have been closed at Tacoma for 9 cents. Herman Klaber, representing Willm. & Uhlman & Co., of San Francisco, has closed agreements with H. Spooner, of Alderton, for 12,000 pounds; with Joseph A. Wallace, of Alderton, for 4,000 pounds, and with M. H. Smith, of McMillan, for 6,000 pounds.

Under the terms the firm makes the usual advances for spraying, picking and securing the crop.

Compilment from Abroad.

Baker City Daily Republican: "Branton, who murdered his victim while sleeping, must pay the penalty of his crime by hanging at Eugene, Oregon. A FORGERY SEEMS EVIDENT.

Daily Guard, March 6

Case No. 43, on the docket of the Lane county circuit court reached an unexpected turn on being called this morning. The case is one wherein E. D. Horner sues J. B. Coleman on a note for \$5000, purported by plaintiff to have been issued to Alice Edmondson by defendant, from whom it was bought by plaintiff. Coleman claims the note is a forgery, pure and simple.

Judge W. S. Hafford, attorney for Horner, this morning filed a motion to dismiss the case, whereupon Plaintiff Horner, and Geo. Weber of this city, whom it is supposed is mixed up in the affair, left the court room. Horner left an order with Eli Bangs for a team to meet him at the corner of Seventh and Olive streets, but fearing to wait for it left the city afoot, and Weber started, but was overtaken near Huddleston's and brought back by Sheriff Withers.

The officers, who had possession of the note yesterday, concluded it was a forgery and were prepared to act. Bench warrants were at once issued for Horner and Weber, and Judge Hafford was detained, being stopped at the S. P. depot, awaiting the arrival of the 10:30 local. Constable Freeman and Chief of Police Stiles left in pursuit of Horner, finding him at Irving, 6 miles below town and returned at 2 P. M.

The note which is the cause of the trouble was issued bearing date of Jan. 5, 1892, is made payable to "Alice Edmondson," and signed by "J. B. Coleman." The amount of the note is \$5000, and in August 13, 1893, bears a credit of \$100. The note is transferred to E. D. Horner, who claims he purchased it from Alice Edmondson.

Young Weber, who is a resident of this city, and a barber by profession, when arrested demanded an examination and the same was set for 4 o'clock this afternoon. He was not confined in the meantime, but was placed in the custody of Deputy Sheriff Howard Mulkey.

Information in the justice court, on which both Horner and Weber are to be examined, accuses them of forging the note.

NOTE FOUND.

Marshal Stiles in company with Deputy Attorney L. T. Harris searched Horner and found concealed in his left sock the note, also a receipt bearing the signature of J. B. Coleman which had evidently been used as copy for the forgery. Horner claimed the note was not in his possession, but after it was found congratulated Marshal Stiles on being a thorough officer.

Weber claims to have owned a half interest in the note, having gone in with Horner to buy it.

The officials have for some time been working on the case and were virtually prepared for the sudden termination of the case as it occurred this morning, yet did not anticipate it coming so soon. The fortunate capture of Horner and his attempted escape, however only adds to the theory of the officials, who deserve credit for their work done.

The Forgery Case.

Daily Guard March 7.

Owing to the suddenness with which the Coleman case was sprung on the public, it has attracted more than the ordinary amount of attention. Rumors and counter rumors are in circulation in many forms, but the cold facts as presented at the preliminary examination before Justice Wintermeyer suffice for the present.

The defendants, E. D. Horner and Geo. Weber, were jointly charged with forgery in the complaint. A few errors in yesterday's GUARD made by misinformation should be corrected. Attorneys J. M. Williams and L. L. Stevens appeared for the defendants, and Deputy Attorney L. T. Harris appeared for the state, assisted by L. Bilyeu and E. R. Skipworth, attorneys for J. B. Coleman. It should have been stated further that credit is due Sheriff Withers for capturing Weber, whom he found near Huddleston's place on West Eighth street.

During the examination expert testimony was presented by M. S. Wallis and C. L. Scott, tending to show that the note purporting to have been issued by J. B. Coleman to Alice Edmondson and transferred to E. D. Horner was a forged instrument; that it was written, signed and transferred in the handwriting of said E. D. Horner; that the indorsement of \$100 on the back of the note was written by defendant Geo. Weber.

Corroborative evidence of a fixed intent to commit crime by defendants was found in a letter written by Defendant Weber to Defendant Horner "enclosing samples for Coleman's signature."

WILL PUSH THE INSURGENTS.

WASHINGTON, March 6.--There is reason to expect important news from Manila within the next fortnight. It has developed that General Otis has practically completed his plans for a grand onslaught on the insurgents, which is expected to deprive them of offensive power at least.

It is probable that he will form a large part of his force into columns as soon as his reinforcements arrive, and will push these in parallel lines straight through the jungles, clearing out the insurgents in every direction as the troops move forward.

The American troops are becoming restless and nervous under the petty but annoying sharpshooting of the Filipinos, and are so anxious to put a stop to this that General Otis has yielded to their desire.

More Than 50 Killed.
