"GOLD DEMOCRATS"

The efforts of gold standard papers like the Oregonian to give some respectability to what by courtesy is called the National Democratic party are painfully ridiculous. In discussing Mayor-elect Harrison, of Chicago, the Oregonian says:

"The 'young Lochlainn' who Mr Robert Roosevelt—Democratic kinsman of the rough-riding Teddy—hopes 'will come out of the West,' is, of course, none other than young Mr Harrison, of Chicago. He is, on the whole, a very eligible man under certain easily possible conditions. He is a gold man, but nevertheless kept his party record straight by supporting the party ticket in the last campaign. He would be an easy compromise between the opposing factions of democracy."

The presidential campaign of 1896 was fought on the financial question. Nothing has since transpired that will remove the money issue from the fore of the next national campaign. That a great party should abjectly lay down its principles and nominate a candidate directly opposed to all its platform enunciations on the great issue to be fought out at the polls in 1900 is inconceivable.

The Oregonian well knows that the "National Democratic" gold ticket was but a tail, and a very small one too, to the McKinley kite. The election returns would convince any fair minded man of the truth of this statement. Here they are: McKinley vote 7,104,779; Bryan 6,502,925; Palmer, [National Democrat] 133,424. Yet the Oregonian speaks of "opposing factions of democracy." Indeed! No comment needed.

A CONTEMPTIBLE SLUR

Oregonian April 10: "Today Mr D P Thompson retires from the board of regents of the state university. Though not long a member of the board, having only been appointed in May of 1897, to fill an unexpired term, he was active and practical, and was using his best endeavors to make the university one in fact as well as name. His successor, Mr N L Butler, of Dallas, ought to prove an earnest and progressive regent."

"In fact as well as name." To appreciate the intended irony of this expression those who have followed the course of the Oregonian in dealing with state university affairs need but recall to mind the fact that for years it has shown unvarying hostility to the university, and has never missed an opportunity to strike a blow at the cause of higher education through state aid. This hobby of the editor accounts for the many unkind and entirely uncalled for attacks and innuendoes of the Oregonian in discussing the state university and its management.

Some day the editor may be made to appreciate the fact that the state university is a fixture in, and a component part of our state educational system, and that every true man should see his influence for its betterment and upbuilding instead of attempting to injure and degrade it.
