SUIT FILED.

County Court Seeks to Have the 100-Foot Street Restored.

EO Potter, WT Bailey and H D Edwards, being the county commissioners of the county court of Lane county, Oregon have instituted suit against A V Peters and Bell Jennings, Wm Preston, J H McClung, J B Coleman, Stephen Smeed and the Eugene Real Estate Company, Geo M Brown, district attorney, LT Harris, deputy district attorney and A C Woodcock appear as attorneys for plaintiff.

This suit is brought to compel these property owners to vacate a 34 foot strip of platted land adjacent to their property, and now occupied by them, which they have refused to do. The county court seeks by this suit to restore the 100-foot street around the county square to the end that the square may be improved.

This suit was filed today and at the time the GUARD goes to press it is not known whether all of the property owners will make a fight on the case. A number of other men own property along the same street against whom suits have not been filed.

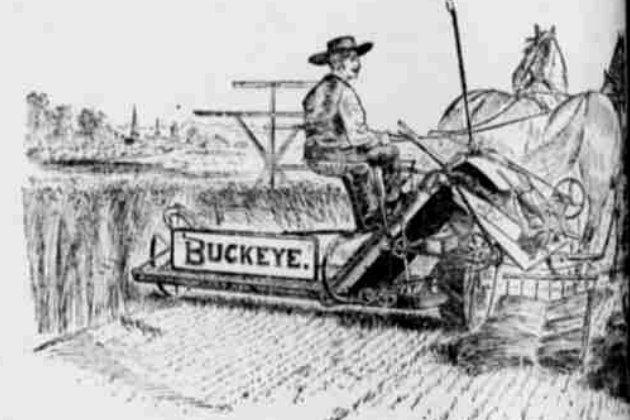
