RR TRAFFIC DEMORALIZED

A big Southern Pacific Trestle Burned at Leland, Oregon.

Roseburg R. view: "About 11 o'clock Saturday night 400 feet of the Southern Pacific trestle, just south of Leland, burned out. Whether it caught from a passing train or was set afire is not known, the last train passing over it having been the north bound overland. This trestle was one of the most important on the road being 125 feet high and its destruction will demoralize traffic for ten or twelve days at least. By that time a temporary structure may be put up to allow trains to pass over, but it will be a month or more before the trestle can be rebuilt.

"For the present passengers and their baggage will be transferred at the break, the north bound overland this morning reaching Roseburg nearly eight hour late. Although freights have been annulled and local trains only will run. Probably no attempt will be made to transfer any great amount of freight.

"Conductor Diekey and his local freight crew reached the trestle from the north about midnight, shortly after it began to burn. From an artistic standpoint it was a beautiful display of fireworks. They think the trestle was set afire by some one purposely."

ACTIVE WORK SOON TO BEGIN.

The mass meeting called Saturday night by the Women's Republican Patriotic League to consider the advisability of erecting a monument to the dead soldiers of Lane county, met with a hearty response.

The band was in attendance and furnished excellent music, while Miss Blanche Straight, Mr and Mrs D. B. Murray, the league ladies and others contributed pleasing musical selections.

The meeting was ably presided over by Mayor T. W. Harris, who concisely stated the object of the call. Addresses were made by Hon. Wm. Kuykendall, Hon. E. R. Skipworth, Hon. S. H. Frydly, Prof. E. B. McElroy, Hon. J. H. McClung, Hon. J. M. Shelby, members of the league and others.

A composite statement of their remarks was thorough sympathy with the movement; a desire to have the entire county take part in the work of love and tribute; and a desire to have the work begin at once.

The ladies of the league have made arrangements to appoint persons in every precinct in the county to take subscriptions to the end that every one may have an opportunity to contribute.

The success of the meeting has created great enthusiasm in the work.

State Normal School.

TRUMPH OF SPOILSMEN.

Civil Service Order More Sweeping Than Reported.

The Chicago Tribune has performed most commendable service in an investigation of the real effect of the president's recent order withdrawing positions from the protection of the classified list of the civil service. The places known to be affected, and that can be counted, aggregate 9240; and there are others whose numbers are variable. Still others are imperiled, owing to the possibilities of evasion created by loose wording of the order.

It has evidently been so framed that persistent politicians can overthrow the merit system in an appalling number of positions throughout every department of the government. The Tribune's tabulation shows:

A WATER FAMINE

Victoria, B. C., June 19.—The people of Cobar mining district in Australia are, according to advices brought by the Warrimoo, suffering great distress through the failure of the water holes and artesian wells, several having died of thirst during May.

Mines are closed down and hundreds of men, thrown out of employment, find themselves unable to pay the exorbitant price demanded for domestic use. The present charge is one shilling a gallon, at the nearest reliable source of supply, and from seven shillings six pence to nine shillings six pence is added for delivery.

AT ROSEBURG

Miss Lottie Saery Elected Goddess of Liberty.

The contest for Goddess of Liberty at Roseburg has closed, the successful contestant being Miss Lottie Saery who received 18,760 votes. In all over 40,000 votes at 1 cent each were purchased, the committee securing \$413.53 as a result.

A WRECK

Astoria Excursion Train Crashed Into a Freight.

ONE MAN KILLED, SIX WERE INJURED.

PORTLAND, June 19.—The special train bearing the Red Men's excursion home from Clatsop beach collided with Northern Pacific freight train No. 54, a mile below Linnton, at 8:55 last evening. One man was killed and six people were injured, two of whom were women. All of the injured, save the engineer and brakemen, were on the baggage-car attached to the excursion train. As near as could be learned the accident was the result of a misunderstanding of orders on part of the train crew of the freight.
