HE "TOOK THE PAPER."

The case of the Westbrook, N Y, Globe-Star against Walter Graffam was decided in favor of the publishers, and Mr Graffam paid \$9.00 judgment and costs for a bill for two years' subscription.

The publishers admitted that Graffam never ordered the paper. The facts were no! disputed that when the Westbrook Globe bought in the Westbrook Star Graffam's name was on the Star list, but without his orders. The new management findding that the Star list contained names that had never subscribed, wrote to all the Star subscribers who had not paid, offering to stop the papers of all who did not expect to pay. Graffam did not answer this notice, but kept on taking the paper and then refused to pay on the ground that he never subscribed.

The plaintiffs argued that the general rule of law, that a man must pay for what he receives and uses, applies to newspapers as well as other things, and the courts sustained that view.

THE MONROE DOUTRINE.

REVOLTS AGAINST GOLD STANDARD

A dispatch from Topeka, Kansas, says former Governor C V Eskridge, editor of the Emporia Republic, heretofore a strong Republican paper, in his last issue takes a radical stand against the gold standard, and has aroused much discussion among the leading Republicans of the state. He says:

"Trusts are the legitimate offspring of the gold standard. It you will get rid of the effect you must remove the cause. Trusts have been formed, are being formed Spokane," "Grizzler," "North Star" and will be formed. Nothing will stop them but a change of the financial policy of the country. All the small industries of the land are being destroyed, men are being w; \$750 thrown out of employment in the shop, factories and on the road. The country is rapidly becoming impoverished, and wealth is concentrating in the hands of the few ... Interior cities are struck with the dry rot, and there is no hope for the people under a gold standard money policy. It is the parent of trusts. It is a money policy which paralyzes industry and drives large fish to eat up the smaller ones. The gold standard is commercial cannibalism. It is seridom for the written consent of the parents of the village Sunday. masses. It is a headwind against all transportation lines. It is the undermining rat of our republican institutions. Don't stop to argue the question with jugglers of figures, but vote to down it, in the party if you can, out of the party if you must. Country first, party next."

Referring to the wealth of the Vanderbilts, Rockefellers, Goulds Astors and others, he says: "If there is any thing that shows the incapacity of the people for self government it is a system of legislation under which the accumulation of such vast sums by individuals is possible."

Governor Eskridge has been a prominent factor in the Republican party since Lincoln's time, and this revolt has created a sensation in Kansas politics.
