### THE PARIS PRESS.

Paris has more daily newspapers than any other city in the world, and most of them range in yellowness from buff to cadmium. There is no organization in France which fills the place of the American Associated Press. Such an institution could scarcely prosper because every French editor wants the facts twisted to suit his own ideas, and therefore each newspaper's matter is prepared exclusively by its own staff. Paris newspapers are served by carriers to some extent, but most of the sales are made at kiosks, where the person in charge is usually a woman. There are very few newsboys.

### SUMMER HAS BEGUN.

The forecast official of Portland, Oregon, announced the pure summer type of weather on July 11. This means that summer has begun in earnest, and warm dry weather will continue until the distinctive winter type makes its appearance. The winter type appeared Nov 12, 1895; Oct 20, 1896; Oct 18, 1897, and Oct 1st 1898. Maps are mailed to individuals who may be interested in such seasonal changes with the request that they be preserved for future reference.

### OREGON'S BEAUTY PRODUCT.

Ohio is trying to decide who is the prettiest woman in the state, and her picture is to be used in all the designs for the Ohio state exposition.

A state that has only one prettiest woman can afford, perhaps, to advertise her charms in the manner proposed. Oregon has the greatest proportion of pretty women to the square mile of any place of its size this side of Mahomet's paradise. It would require twenty forty-horse power composite photographs to do justice to Eugene alone, to say nothing of Salem, Albany and other minor outside provinces which contribute their several mites to the aggregation of female loveliness, which, is perhaps, the leading product of our common wealth.

### DON'T LACK ASSURANCE.

The State Banker's Association of New York held a meeting at Alexandria Bay, in that state, Saturday, and among other resolutions adopted the following joker:

"That we approve and ask the adoption by congress, of the following changes in our currency laws.

"First, that all obligations of the United States shall be paid in gold coin, of standard value.

"Second, that legal tender notes, when redeemed by the government, shall not be re-issued on a deposit of gold coin.

"Third, that national banks shall be allowed to take out notes."

These New York bankers don't lack assurance. According to the New York World almanac of 1899 there are in the United States \$696,300,000 of gold coin, and \$1,041,500,000 of silver and government paper money. These New York bankers would have this govern-

ment ignore two thirds of its own money, that passes current among the people, and pay the obligations which are held almost exclusively by banks from the scarce one-third.

After reading this resolution there need be no doubt in the mind of any intelligent person why the banking interests of the country supported McKinley who was pledged to the maintenance of the gold standard. But how about the creditor class that must borrow money from the banks? Is there any reason why they should support this gold standard, gold bond, pledge brecking administration?

Lord Charles Beresford is not one of those Englishmen who get angry when they hear of the large English orders for American railway material. "As a Britisher," he says, "I deplore that we for a time seem unable to hold our own against America or any other competitors, but I do not think that healthy rivalry of this sort will ever be detrimental to either. Our manufacturers must move with the times and put down newer plant."

A part of this United States is our second best customer, and we are the largest customer she has. The food of the British working man is more dependent upon the good-will of the United States than upon any other country. On the other side, where the American manufacturer abroad finds an open market for its surplus products, and free trading facilities, it is the British tax payer, by means of the British fleet, who has opened and kept the market open.

Captain Oberlin M Carter, although it has been proven that he is guilty of robbing the government of upwards of \$100,000 is still a free man. For some unaccountable reason President McKinley stands between him and punishment. The court martial that tried him recommended that he be dismissed from the army; that he be imprisoned for five years; that he be fined \$5000, and that publication of his crime and disgrace be made in the newspapers of his own town for one year. More than a year has passed since this verdict was rendered, and yet President McKinley refuses to allow this man to suffer the penalty of his crime.—Ex.

It is reported that postmasters of the United States will be required by the government to wear a uniform hereafter consisting of light blue pants with red stripes, a white blouse with gold shoulder straps, and skull cap with a silver star in front. We hope there is some mistake about the report. We care nothing for postmasters of other towns, but would dislike to see Postmaster McCornack fitted out in such a stunning style. He is no dude, and the costume would not be appropriate for his use.

Roseburg Review: "If the state of affairs exists in the Bohemia mining district indicated by the

reports printed in today's Review, then it is high time that the Douglas county authorities took a hand in the affair. Such lawlessness can only result in retarding the development of the district by intimidating those who might otherwise invest their capital there. A thorough investigation is certainly in order." ### LARGE LOGGING BUSINESS.

One Company Making Drives Aggregating 10,000,000 Feet.

The Spaulding Logging Company now have about 10,000,000 feet of logs in the drive they have just started from the McKenzie and Santiam rivers. A portion of the logs are yellow fir; the greater portion are balsam. The logs will be taken to the Oregon City pulp mills and will be utilized in the manufacture of pulp. It will take about a month or more for the logs to run down to Newberg. The water in the river is at a much better stage than ordinarily, which is greatly to the advantage to the company in moving their logs.

The camp at McKean is under the supervision of Mr Miles; C K Spaulding has charge of the Santiam camp. This company has control of the logging business in this part of Oregon, and the managers have a thorough knowledge of the business, and are making a grand success of it financially.
