An editor from the rice fields of Louisiana concluded an extended and interesting account of his nine thousand mile tour with the National Editorial excursion with this compliment to the West and Northwest:

Amid such scenes the fast flying days of the National Editorial excursion passed into record."

ENGLISH SUPPORT OF PARENTS

English courts do not hesitate to compel the support of indigent parents by their children. A copy of an English paper of recent date has examples in point. It says:

"James Osmond, of Margate, was summoned for neglecting to support his father, who was chargeable to the common fund of the West Ashford Guardians. Mr G G Taylor, relieving officer, said that originally defendant agreed to pay 1s 6d a week, but afterwards this was reduced to 1s. He had, however, failed to keep up the payments. The relieving officer at Margate had made enquiries as to the position of the defendant, and Mr Taylor read a letter which said he was an employer of labor. Defendant denied that he had signed any agreement to pay weekly installments, saying that he could neither read nor write. His wife signed his name for him. The Bench pointed out that the signatures on the two agreements differed, and upon being shown them defendant admitted signing the letter. An order was made for the payment of 1s. 6d. a week and the costs 10s. 6d. Stephen Breeds, a tailor, was similarly summoned. Figures were put forward by Mr Taylor showing that defendant could, if he liked, earn nearly £3 a week. An order was made for 2s. 6d. a week and the costs, which in this case amounted to 9s."

NATIONAL BANK BUSINESS.

The complete returns from the national banks of the country giving reports of conditions at the close of business on June 30, show that the aggregate discount business of the national banks at present is \$2,492,410,895, which is an increase of \$88,819,000 over the discounts and loans of the banks of the April period covered by the last report. In respect to the individual deposits, the increase of business is reflected in a more marked degree. It is now about a year since the national bank holdings' subject to check mounted above the \$2,000,000,000 mark, but the jump of nearly \$500,000 in the individual deposit line for the national banks of the country during the past year is the record the banks have to present at this time.

ENGLISH HOP REPORT.

"Prospects More Favorable Than For Years."

At Stephen Smith, of Waterville, sends the GUARD a copy of the Kentish Express, of July 22nd, published in the main hop growing district of England. It gives a good part of a column to hop prospect reports, and summarizes as follows:
"From all the hop-growing districts very favorable reports come to hand as to the progress made this week. The weather has been of a forcing nature, and though rain would have been and would be very beneficial, all traces of backwardness have now disappeared, and in its place is a luxuriant growth of blue, which bears the stamp of fruitfulness. Some Mid-Kent growers on Thursday remarked that certain pieces already looked like a ton an acre, though of course this does not apply generally. Still there is no doubt that the prospects are more favorable than they have been for years, and this is all the more satisfactory because of the extraordinary little spraying which has been required up to the present. Lice there are, but they are very small in quantity, and mould and red spider have not caused any great anxiety as yet, only having appeared here and there in the lower leaves."

FOREST RANGERS.

Captain Ormsby Feels About Fires, Sheep and Subordinate.

A Salem dispatch says: "Captain S B Ormsby, superintendent of forest reserves in Oregon, has just returned from Roseburg, where he had a conference with Commissioner of the General Land Office, Ranger Hermann. They talked over matters connected with the government forest reserve policy and methods of supervision, the commissioner outlining his ideas and Captain Ormsby making suggestions. Captain Ormsby says this has been an exceptional year in the forests. The damage by forest fires this far this year, he says, is comparatively small, only a few big fires being reported."

There are forty-four rangers and three supervisors in Oregon, and they have put out many fires in their incipency, thus preventing the killing and burning of a great amount of timber. Captain Ormsby has so far, this year, granted 45 permits to graze sheep in forest reserves, representing about 140,000 sheep, a falling off of 85,000 since last year. Commissioner Hermann, Captain Ormsby says, will return to Washington about the last of this month."

It was finally determined to file a complaint in the county court charging the parents with cruel and inhuman treatment and asking that the boy be committed to the Boys and Girls Aid Society, of Portland. Mr Hawk shortly after noon went after the boy but found that he had been removed to Mr Talley's residence. The officers then notified the father that the boy would be taken to the care of the society, peacefully or forcibly. The father partially consented to the former in his talk. The punishment was certainly extreme, whatever the boy's offenses might have been.
