BY FALSE PRETTENSES.
Alleged Swindle Practiced by Two Alsea Men.
Monroe, Or., Oct. 9.—A Wilhelm & Sons, of this place, made a discovery Friday, that may lead to the placing of several persons in the penitentiary. For some months past, it has been the custom of residents in the Alsea country to peel casaca or chittum bark, dry and sort it, and then bring it to Monroe for sale. Among those who followed this line of work was a firm composed of C B Fleece and W B Taylor, which turned in unusual quantities of the medicinal article. By an accident to one of the sacks of bark supposed to have been purchased from this firm Wilhelm found the contents were not just what they had been heretofore supposed to be, since rock, stones, oak and fir bark, besides other articles, were mixed in with the salable bark. Saturday morning Fleece came into town with another load, but scenting danger shortly after arriving, turned his horse's head Alseaward, but he was too late. Officers stopped him before he had gone a mile from town, examined his load and arrested him.

MAN KILLED

Stephen New Lost His Life in a Sewer Ditch.

FULL ACCOUNT.
Daily Guard, Oct 10
Last evening about 5:15 o'clock Stephen New, who was working in the new sewer running north and south in the alley between Seventh and Eighth streets, lost his life through a cave in. Many willing hands, his fellow workmen sprung to his assistance, but too late, as the spirit had fled.
From the evidence introduced this forenoon before Coroner Cheshire and a jury consisting of G R Christian, C S Frank, Cnas Beadle, George W Kinsey, Al Holden and J S Gray, the following gentlemen being witnesses: Alfred Whitney, C T Denny, M S Barker, John Mercer, Mr Hawley and Dr Kuykendall, we give the following account:
It appears that the contractors for the main sewer are M S Barker and W B Mummy; the sub-contractors for 1100 feet ending on Eighth are Hawley Blighton and Oleson. Where the accident occurred is just back of the John B Coleman property, Pearl street, and in the alley. The sub-contractors dug the ditch at the point specified a couple of days ago, the sewer pipe was laid therein, and most of the cribbing removed to be used in the work further on. It was detected by the city surveyor that a mistake had been made, and that about forty feet of the pipe would have to be dug out and the same lowered about six inches at the north end. This work was being accomplished when the fatal accident occurred. Mr Denny, one of the men asked to work at the point, refused, as he considered it too dangerous without more and stronger cribbing. He communicated this fact to Mr New and a number of other workmen. Mr New replied, and said that he thought it perfectly safe and continued at his work. In this connection, Mr Denny said that the contractors, Messrs. Barker & Mummy, had told them to use all the lumber needed in cribbing, and not to work where they thought it dangerous. Alfred Whitney was working alongside Mr New when the cave-in occurred, and Mr Denny was only a few feet distant, while other men were scattered along the line. Mr Whitney says he heard the dirt coming and jumped just in time to save being injured severely, the dirt only covering him up to his knees. His companion, Mr New, was less fortunate and lost his life. He was covered up to his neck, and a 12-inch cribbing board was held against his breast with tons of dirt. His companions went to work at once to dig him out. The shock did not instantly kill him. The first thing New said was: "Dig me out!" "This time I am caught in a tough place!" "It is tough to be served this way!" soon the workmen had the board sawed off, the dirt removed and the unfortunate man on the surface. But it was too late. Life had flown. Dr Kuykendall tried a number of means to resuscitate him, but without avail.
At the point where the accident occurred the ditch is about 12 feet deep. The body was then removed to the undertaking establishment of Day & Henderson, where it was prepared for burial.

VERDICT OF CORONERS JURY.
We, the jury called to inquire into the cause of the death of the person whose body lies before us, find that his name is S. New; that he was a resident of Eugene, Oregon, and that he came to his death in Eugene, Oregon, on October 9, 1899, by being suffocated in a ditch, between Seventh and Eighth streets, in which he was employed, caused by the bank caving in.
We further find that the contractors, M S Barker and W B Mummy, are guilty of gross negligence in failing to properly crib said ditch.
