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SPRINGFIELD MILL

H. A. Skeels & Co's Boom of Logs Go to Pieces.

200 PASS THE MILL.

A telephonic message from Springfield received this (Friday) morning, says: "H A Skeels & Co had about 1,500,000 feet of fine logs boomed in the Willamette river some miles above Springfield when the sudden rise in the river occurred. The boom broke sometime yesterday in the early morning. The mill shut down and employees left for the scene of the broken boom, and have not returned. They thought they could repair it. It is hard to tell what the loss will be. About 200 of the logs have passed Springfield in the river. The river is now falling."

BOOM BROKE

Eugene Lumber Company Loses To Protect Their Interests at This Time.

THE RIVER AT A STAND

Daily Guard, Oct 19. At 4 o'clock this morning the boom of the Eugene Lumber Company broke releasing about 200 logs which drifted with the swift current and down the Willamette. While some of the logs will of course be saved, the loss will foot up several hundred dollars, probably \$400 in the aggregate. The company is very fortunate in having most of this seasons drive already saved, and piled up in their yards, and it is a fine quality of lumber.

As it was known that the drive for the Harrisburg mill had been only a short time since, and thinking their boom might still be out, and thus catch the logs from this place Dwight Hopkins telephoned Harrisburg this morning, only to learn that their boom had been taken up.

During the forenoon a few logs came down the river, presumed to be from the mill of Skeel & Son at Springfield.

GAME LAW.

Game and Forestry Warden Quimby Gives the Law.

HOPS.

NEW YORK MARKET. Reports from interior markets noted what appeared to have been more willingness to sell at prices on the basis of 10 and 11 cents there for strictly choice quality. Orders from brewers at 1 and 2 cents over that basis were completed for keenly by interior and city dealers, particularly by the former, and sellers of Pacific coast stock were actively looking after their interests. Yearlings and olds were in limited demand and not easily salable at current quotations.

ENGLISH MARKET.

London, Oct. 3.—The market has practically come to a deadlock owing to the unfavorable reports from the Canterbury district. Inferior and discolored growth are slow at a decline of 10s, but the best grades are scarce and firm, and a few lots of Mid and East Kent, £4 4s to £5 10s; mid, £4 to £5 5s; weals £3 10s; to £4 15s; Sussex, £2 10s; to £4 10s; yearlings, 8s to 11s. Pickings is considered practically over. Continentals are slow, and Belgian and Altmarks are now offering at 42s to 50s. The later pickings there have been interfered with by unfavorable weather.

HOP GROWERS

To Protect Their Interests at This Time.

THURSDAY, OCT. 20, 10 A. M.

A meeting of the hop growers is hereby called to assemble in the Court House at Eugene, Thursday forenoon at 10 o'clock to organize an association. It is highly necessary that every grower be present. It is asserted that the hop buyers have pooled interests for low prices. Let's investigate and organize.

HOP MEN WILL COMBINE.

WOODBURN, Or., Oct. 18.—On a call issued by the Butteville Hopgrowers' Association, about 200 hopmen from Clackamas, Marion, Washington and Yamhill counties met in Remington's theater today to take steps toward maintaining the price of hops. This was the result of the present unsatisfactory condition of the market, coupled with the belief that dealers are manipulating prices so as to bring prices still lower. After considerable discussion it was agreed that an incorporation should be organized with a capital of \$25,000, the object of which should be to give financial assistance to the small growers, who would thus be enabled to hold their hops.

A new organization was also perfected, known as the Willamette Valley Hopgrowers' Association, with headquarters in Woodburn, and the following officers: President, George E Hovenden; secretary, Henry L Bents, treasurer, Frank Feders. These men have 25 to 100 acres of hops each.

The hopgrowers say they have evidence that satisfies them that dealers are doing everything in their power to keep hop prices low—even offering to Eastern buyers hops at a lower price than they can be obtained for in Oregon in order that reports based on such offers may induce the growers to sell cheap. The growers believe that extensive manipulation of the market is being resorted to, and they take this means of protecting themselves.

The association adjourned to meet again here October 25, when the new organization is to be perfected and put in working order.

WITHOUT LOSS.—We understand that the logs, 2,700,000 feet, for the Coburg mill, furnished by Forrest and Woodcock, were delivered without loss.

LATER.

The boom broke Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the middle of the river, the water being at a 7-foot stage. The above run of logs was saved entire, but another from the upper river was only partially saved. It is estimated that 300 or 400 logs passed Coburg. These will be mostly captured at points below.
