GOLD GALORE

Mr. White, of Blue River, Is Taking Out Ounces of Gold.

ONLY A HAND MILL. Daily Guard, Nov. 16. Blue River is destined to be one of the noted mining camps on the Pacific Coast as soon as a little more development work is done.

Mr. White, who has a claim on Gold Hill, Blue River district, and who made a rich strike of quartz some time since, is now taking out gold from the rock in a crude way that excites the old miners in that district.

He has attached water power to his small mill. The rock is averaging \$1 per pound, or \$2,000 to the ton.
