Official Report of British Modder River Losses.

LOSS AT MAGERSFONTEIN.

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 11.—An official report of the British casualties Sunday and Monday at Modder River gives the list of killed and wounded at 317. Fifteen officers are among the dead.

At Magersfontein the loss is even greater. The report gives 650 as the number of casualties, with 10 officers killed, 33 wounded and 4 missing.

The British appear nonplused at the stubborn fighting of the Boers, the intelligence they are displaying and their success.

THE POULTRY SHOW

Exhibits Have Been Placed and Much Interest Taken.

PROBABLY OPENED TODAY.

The Willamette Poultry Association opened its 42nd annual show this morning at the corner of Ninth and Pearl streets, this city. All the exhibits had been brought in, and officers of the Association were busy registering and classifying the birds.

It is too early to give a detailed list of entries but some general statements will prove of interest. Last year about 400 birds were entered, this year nearly 500. In all nearly 50 distinct varieties are represented, and the largest number of fowls of any one kind are the Plymouth Rocks, 50 of these handsome birds being exhibited in one aisle of the show. Birds are on exhibition by the Lane county fanciers, and in addition coops have been sent up from Portland, Jefferson, Albany, Rowland and other points.

The marking of premiums will be done by the score card system, and will begin this evening or tomorrow morning.

The attendance is good and every indication points to the most successful show ever given by the association.

SIGNING THE CONTRACT.

Oregon Hopgrowers Fast Getting Their Product in a Pool.

BROOKS, Or., Dec. 12.—President M. L. Jones, of the Oregon Hopgrowers Association, says that the officers of this body have about completed the work of forming the large pool of hops. All the work of educating the individual growers has been done, and he will issue at once a call to all the growers to hold local or district meetings, and there sign the contract, turning all hops yet unsold over to the association. From each one of these local meetings, which are to be held Saturday of this week, it is expected that delegates will be sent to Salem to a mass meeting on Tuesday, December 19, when final arrangements will be completed.

The market is decidedly firmer already, in view of what has been done, and if the growers will hold together under the new plan recently adopted by the board of directors of the Oregon Hopgrowers' Association and unanimously accepted by public meetings held since in Woodburn, Salem, Independence and other points, the attainment of good prices—the real reason for the existence of this association—will have been accomplished.

At Independence 5,000 bales have been signed to the pool and more are to follow.

At Sherwood 750 bales were subscribed yesterday.

Most of Lane county growers favor the plan.

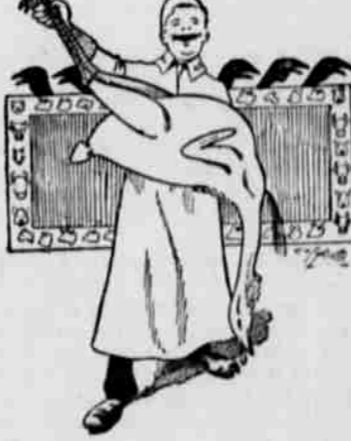
