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FLORENCE PROSPERITY.
The West is Hopeful and Gives Reasons for Its Hopes.
A saw mill was erected at Acme last summer with a much greater capacity than the mill burned in February. It is backed by capital sufficient to operate the mill. A new store was opened there a few months ago.
The saw mill at Spruce Point, which, since it was built some eight years ago had run a few times for short periods, has been in operation most of the time since last spring. It is regarded as almost a certainty that the next few months will see a large mill erected in Florence and owned by an enterprising firm. There is good prospects for another good mill in Acme in the near future.
The loggers are all busy cutting timber to supply the mills. Many new camps have been started on account of the increasing demand and better prices for logs. Timber is being sought for eagerly and now commands a good advance over what has been asked in previous years.
Prospects are good that a shipyard will be established on the river next summer where shipbuilding can be carried on steadily. This will mean profitable employment for many hands and a market at home for a goodly quantity of lumber.
