

ALONG THE COAST.

Commercial and Financial Happenings of Interest to the Growing Western States.

It is reported that Coggins Bros., the big saw-mill men of Igerna, Siskiyon county, who own a large tract of valuable timber land on Hungary creek, west of Coles and near the Oregon-California state line on the south side of Siskiyou mountain, will put in a saw mill on their property in the spring. They have secured by purchase from Stockton parties, by lieu land process, and purchase from railroad, seven sections of fine timber land in that section and will build a railroad from a point this side of Cole's to the scene of the mill operations. The distance is three or four miles in a straight line, but it will require a switchback railroad of six miles to reach their timber. They will ship the lumber to the general markets and to their box factory at Igerna.

Outlook Bright for Loggers. The outlook for the loggers is brighter now, says the Budget at Astoria, than it has been for a long time, notwithstanding that most of the logging camps are shut down for a time, while short days and bad weather are the rule. Some 5,000,000 or 6,000,000 feet of logs just floated out of the Elokamin river, have been sold to the North Pacific Lumber Company for \$6.50 per 1,000, which is he highest price paid for logs in this section for probably eight or 10 years. 


