ADVANCE MADE.
General Buller Moving Toward Ladysmith.
BOERS ARE RETREATING.
Special to the GUARD.
LONDON, Jan. 18.—General Buller's army succeeded in crossing the Tugela river today without encountering any resistance, and is advancing to the relief of Ladysmith and General White. While this report is received with evident gratification by the war department, there is no great hope expressed that he will be successful. This is the most vital move made by Buller for several weeks and may mean more than the department anticipates.
The Boers who have been surrounding Ladysmith are said to be retreating toward the hills. General Warren is moving his forces across the river on pontoons.

Judge Hewitt is a man of ability, and has many friends throughout this judicial district. He will undoubtedly go into the congressional convention with considerable strength.

JUNCTION CITY, Jan. 17.—William Lewis died at the residence of Mr. Coltrane, on Long Tom, Monday. Mr. Lewis was a stranger here, having come from California about two years ago. He was a very quiet man, and about 65 years of age.
WHEAT.—Commercial Review of Portland, January 18: "With the close today the wheat price had lost just 3c within a week. Coming on top of the long and almost uniform decline of the fall months, it has had a tendency to make the professional trader more bearish than it has been. Valuing, 50c per bushel. Thin wheat coming in has been sold as low as 34c per bushel, and some of it is hardly worth that. Millers in the interior are having trouble in securing No. 1 wheat, and holders are asking from 20c to 25c per bushel premium for this article. Many of the mills are compelled to pay this to keep up their grade of flour; others refuse to pay fancy prices and are working part time. There is nothing encouraging in the wheat market, and the outlook seems that prices will be lower on account of large supplies in Argentina and Australia."
BABB DID NOT APPEAR.—Today's Oregonian: "The case of Ray Babb, the young man, who, in his zeal to assist the newboys destroy the carriers' papers Tuesday afternoon, committed an assault on an employee of the Telegram, came up in the municipal court yesterday, but Babb did not. His brother, who had 'stood guard' for his appearance, was there and explained that Babb was out of town. Judge Hennessy deferred the hearing of the case till Friday evening, when Babb will be on hand or learn a thing or two about triffing with the law."
