BRITISH CLAIM AN ADVANCE.

Report That Buller Has Crossed the Rappahannock.

GOEBEL STILL LIVES

Special to Guard.

LONDON, Feb. 1.—An unverified report was posted on the stock exchange today to the effect that General Buller had recrossed the Tugela at three different points, and is making a systematic deploy toward Ladysmith. The Boers are intercepting Buller at various places along the line, and fighting of a general nature is said to have occurred all day.

It is further reported that the British now occupy Preiska west of Kimberly.

The discussion in parliament reveals the fact that a lack of confidence exists in the present management of the war. The ministers show an inability to thoroughly grasp the situation and make vociferous criminations of self-defense. So plainly is this weakness shown that there is much quibbling as to the degree of responsibility attaching to the respective departments, for the failure to conduct a more successful campaign.

AFFAIRS IN KENTUCKY.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Feb. 1.—Wm. Goebel is still alive, and passed a comfortable night, but his condition is yet critical. The vitality of the man is remarkable, as the attending physicians announced yesterday he could not live through the night.

The sympathy of the militiamen now guarding the capitol is divided between Goebel and Taylor. Appeals have been circulated asking the people to drive out the militia, but there seems to be no disposition to take aggressive action. Excitement continues intense and the present tension cannot long be maintained. Either peace will be restored, or there will be wholesale crime yet to be recorded more horrible than anything which has occurred in the United States for years.

Taylor still controls the militia, and their presence here is an unknown quantity so far as time is concerned. Attorneys of Taylor and Goebel had a conference today, but have so far failed to reach an agreement for a settlement of any kind.

FRUIT PESTS.

Nothing to Fear From Scale in Lemons and Oranges.

Anxiety is felt by some lest the scale found on lemons purchased at our grocery stores infect our native fruits, the apple, pear, etc. There is not the slightest cause for alarm on this point, as this scale is confined to citrus fruits and is never found on apple, pear, peach, cherry, etc., which suffer so severely here from San Jose scale. Prof. Washburn has specimens of this scale, (he has in fact a large collection of scale insects) and will be pleased to show them to any one not familiar with the appearance of this pest, against which such active measures are being taken in this city.

A Decision.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 30, 1900.
SUPT. W. M. MILLER, Eugene—Dear Sir: The following decision has been rendered by this department relative to the salaries of district clerks: The directors of any school district may pay their clerk such compensation as is, in their judgment, necessary; provided, such compensation is not paid out of the common school fund. The law specifically mentions the purposes to which the common school fund may be applied, and the salary of the school clerk is not mentioned therein. The only reference to the clerk's salary is in connection with the collection of taxes, and it is evident that the intent of the law was to pay the clerk for his services from the money derived from the district tax and not from the common school fund.

MUST CLEAN ORCHARDS.—The state board of horticulture notifies fruitmen, orchardists and nurserymen that the quarantine law passed by the last legislature will be strictly enforced. All orchards infested with pests must be cleaned or entirely destroyed. "We call special attention of growers and shippers to section 5," said the secretary, "and notice is hereby given that diseased, scabby, wormy or scaly fruit will not be allowed to be sold in any of the markets of this state hereafter. While the board hopes that it will not be necessary to use harsh measures, it must be fully understood that in case of non-compliance the law will be strictly enforced."

REMAINS OF OREGON DEAD

Caskets of the Volunteers Decorated at the Presidio.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 30.—Friends and relatives of the Second Oregon volunteers visited the Presidio this afternoon and decorated with violets, ferns and roses the caskets of the dead soldiers of that regiment who were brought here from Manila on the transport a few days ago. The bodies are in hermetically sealed caskets, under guard, near the testing ground where their comrades lately shivered in the fog and wind of the Presidio. If the remains are not called for they will be buried in the national cemetery here with military honors. WILL BE BROUGHT HOME.

The bodies of Wistar Hawthorne and Charles Horn will be brought to Eugene for interment, the former being sent for by his parents, Professor and Mrs. B. J. Hawthorne, and the latter by the Lane County Veterans Association. As soon as the boys found that the body of Horn was unclaimed, they immediately communicated with Colonel Long at The Presidio and gave him instructions to send the body here. He replied by saying the sanitary conditions there were such that it would be several days before the bodies would be started. It is very probable that the bodies of both soldiers will be shipped together.

BLUE RIVER.

Second Clean-Up of Gold at Lucky Boy.

NEW CONCENTRATING MACHINERY.

BLUE RIVER, Or., Jan. 30.—The second clean-up of gold has gone out from the Lucky Boy mill, and it was much more satisfactory to the owners than the first. A great deal has to be learned by practical working before the value of a new camp can be ascertained, and this all takes time and money. It was always supposed that this mine was a strictly free-milling proposition, near the surface, at least, but the running of 20 feet more distance in each of the upper tunnels struck large bodies of high-grade concentrating ore, assays of which run from \$275 to \$1000 per ton in gold—all which runs over the copper plates and is lost. New concentrating machinery has been ordered in San Francisco by the company, and timbers are being got out for the necessary addition to the mill building, and it is the intention to have things going in a very short time. The mill runs steadily day and night, and everything is moving along nicely, and, to the surprise of many, we have no snow here, and the weather is lovely.

The two tunnels referred to are showing a fine body of ore, and the ledge is widening as depth is attained, but with this free-milling process the concentrates are lost, and a change must be made as soon as the proper machinery can be got in place. But little snow is on Gold Hill, so work could be done on many claims, but the Excelsior is the only one being worked. Three men are at work taking out ore there, and it is confidently expected that a new mill will be erected there the coming season.
