### BRITISH ADVANCE SLIGHTLY.

LONDON, March 8.—The Mafeking garrison is dispendent. After the admirable work of the British army at other points, this garrison has anticipated relief at any time, but the failure causes them to feel a sense of annoyance and fallen pride. With this exception every condition seems to be hopeful from a British point of view.

Charged With Rape of Miss Winnie Thorn.

### HARVEY YET TO BE TRIED

ROSEBURG, March 8.—Hugh Patterson, Southern Pacific brakeman, charged with rape of Winnie Thorn, a Cottage Grove girl under the legal age of consent, was found guilty today as charged in the indictment. The jury was out one hour. Patterson will be sentenced Monday. The case of B. F. Harvey, charged with the same crime, will be brought to trial at once.

[The punishment for this crime is fixed by the Oregon statutes at imprisonment in the penitentiary for not less than three years nor more than twenty years.—Ed.]

### THE CLEARY CASE.

The sentence of Geo. Cleary, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, to which he pleaded guilty, has been postponed until tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

### THE BOHEMIA MINES.

The case on trial today is that of G. G. Warner vs Jennings Bros and Chas. Brunau, for the recovery of the famous Helena mine in the Bohemia district. The defendants opened up the mine and have placed on the ledge a small stamp mill. It is said that there is over \$10,000 worth of gold in sight. Warner claims a previous discovery. Much interest is prevalent and some 40 or 50 witnesses are in attendance from Lane county upon the case. The case is being hotly contested by the attorneys.

## GENERAL WHEELER

Says Philippines Are Ready for Territorial Government.

### OTIS TO RETURN.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 8.—General Joe Wheeler and party, who arrived a few days ago from the Philippines, were landed from quarantine last night. General Wheeler has resigned from the army and expects to resume his seat in congress. He is looking fine and the campaign has strengthened his health. Speaking of conditions in the islands General Wheeler said that the Philippines are ready for territorial government. The only fighting going on is an occasional band of guerrillas, who infest the islands.

### OPPOSITION TO CORBIN.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The opposition to Adjutant-General Corbin, who seeks to be appointed a major-general, have obtained a statement from Colonel Morgan, who was Corbin's superior officer in the civil war, saying that Corbin proved to be an abject coward in battle, exciting ridicule by his actions. The statement further declares that Corbin offered his resignation to Morgan, but subsequently withdrew it.

### OTIS TO RETURN.

NEW YORK, March 8.—General Otis has been instructed to return to the United States from the Philippines, accompanying three battalions which will be ordered home. The conduct of affairs seem to be practically settled.

### THE QUEEN IN IRELAND.

DUBLIN, March 8.—The newspapers of this city indicate a chilly reception to the announcement that Queen Victoria is to visit Ireland.
