ENGLAND DECLINES MEDIATION.

The British Government Will Settle her Own Scores With the South African Republic

Special to the Guard.

LONDON, March 13.—The answer of Prime Minister Salisbury to the offer of the United States government to mediate the differences between her majesty's government and the South African republics has been given to United States Minister Choate.

The British government declines the offer of mediation from this republic, though acknowledging the obligations conferred through the tender of our good offices.

MEDIATION.

Favorable Reply From Germany --France Will Not Participate.

THE PLAGUE SITUATION.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13.—Advice by the steamer just arrived from Honolulu are that the bubonic plague situation is more favorable for the stamping out of the disease than for months.

Strict quarantines are being enforced which accounts for much of the improvement in the plague epidemic in the islands.

WILL FIGHT IT OUT.

LONDON, March 13.—The United States, through her minister to Great Britain, tendered her good offices as mediator for the Boers.

Prime Minister Salisbury will probably decline the offer made by the American government.

FRANCE AND GERMANY.

LONDON, March 13.—The French government declines to participate in any effort to mediate the difficulty between Great Britain and the Boer republics. The answer of France is that "Mediation would defeat its own object."

BERLIN, March 13.—The German government has expressed a willingness to participate with other countries in the attempt at mediation.

ENGLAND'S ANSWER.

LONDON, March 13.—The answer of the British government to the Boers was read in parliament today by Prime Minister Salisbury.

The representative of Great Britain specifically states that his government will not assent to the independence of the South African republics.

WM. J. BRYAN

Will Speak at Albany and Salem March 28.

WILL AROUSE THE NORTHWEST.

TACOMA, March 13.—The tour of the North Pacific states to be made by William Jennings Bryan includes addresses in the Willamette valley.

As the dates are now arranged, the distinguished politician and orator will speak at both Albany and Salem on March 28. Notifications have been sent to these towns and it is expected that large and enthusiastic crowds will gather at each point, larger in fact than when Mr. Bryan spoke at LeBauon two years ago.

Cottage Grove Happy.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., March 12.—A telegram was received here today from Roseburg announcing that the suit of G. G. Warner vs Bruneau & Jennings Bros. was decided in favor of the defendants. This was a suit to determine the ownership of the Helena mine, in the Bohemia mining district, which is probably the richest mine on the Pacific Coast. Ninety-five per cent of the people here are satisfied with the verdict. Bruneau & Jennings Bro's have run out 500 feet of tunnels, and have expended about \$12,000 in labor and machinery, and have at the present time \$200,000 in sight. The mill will be started at once, and it is estimated that \$10,000 will be the clean-up of the first 10-days' run.
