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# WHAT DOES FRANCE MEAN?

## The European Republic Asks Her Colonies As to Available Soldiers.

PARIS, March 15.—Word comes from an unimpeachable source that the French government has asked each of her colonies as to the number of troops available for immediate service. It begins to look as if France were preparing for war.

England has greatly strengthened her fleet in Chinese waters in anticipation of a concerted French and Russian movement to cripple her in the far east. Russian acquisition of territory from the north and west of China and French aggrandizement on the south may be opportune through England having her hands full in South Africa.

### DOMESTIC WAR EXPECTED IN CHINA.

SHANGHAI, China, March 15.—The hostile attitude of the empress dowager towards reform and progress in state and commercial affairs is thought to render an open door policy for China under her regime impossible.

Rebellion and anarchy are expected and prophesied by foreign diplomats who have the best opportunities to give an unbiased opinion of possible events that may follow government hostility to open door agitation.

### A FILIPINO SECRETARY SURRENDERS.

He becomes more strongly convinced every day that imposing this tariff is the proper and only course to pursue.

### J. B. Nesmith Critically Ill.

DALLAS, March 14.—J. B. Nesmith, oldest son of Senator J. W. Nesmith, is now lying critically ill at his home in Dixie, this county. The disease is a brain affection. The latest news from the sick man seems to give more hope of his recovery.

LEFT THE CITY.—Hilda Hobson, of lively-gait fame, quitted Corvallis Saturday night, says the Corvallis Times. "During the afternoon she had a preliminary hearing before Justice Hogate, but the evidence was not deemed sufficient to warrant the detention of the prisoner to the grand jury. The Elgin horse and buggy had simply been taken to Harrisburg, and there left for the Corvallis owner to recover it as best he could. This was not farcical enough to insure a conviction in the court, and on motion of the deputy district attorney the case was dropped. The woman was penniless, and after her discharge was given \$6 or \$8, contributed by local sympathizers. She was at once driven to Albany, where she declared she was going to Eugene." ### BAD ACCIDENT.

#### Will Baker Seriously Crushed in Mine Tunnel.

The following account of an accident in the Iron Mountain mine, California, is taken from a paper published at Keewick, California. The young man, who was with company C, at Manila, writes to his mother Mrs. Melissa Baker, that his injuries are not as bad as portrayed by the newspaper:

Another accident, which will probably prove fatal, occurred at the Iron Mountain mine Monday evening. The victim of the accident is a young man about 22 years old, named Will Baker, formerly of Eugene, Oregon, who has been employed in the mine about six months.

While emerging from the mine he was caught between the car and a projecting timber and severely crushed. His two hips were broken and his ribs were crushed in. It is the opinion of the company's physicians that he cannot recover.

After the victim and a companion had entered the tunnel with the car, a still, or upright timber, gave in to the strain from above and swayed out badly. No room was left for the passage of a car-tender between the car and the still. It was there that the young man was caught and so badly crushed.

Hors.—Oregonian: "The hop market is steady on choice grades, and weak on poor grades, there being a large surplus of the latter. A few sales have been made since last week at prices ranging from 2 1/2 cents per pound up to 7 cents, with but very few choice hops available in this market. In California stocks have been pretty well sold out, some reports stating that less than 250 bales remain, with two-thirds of these poor quality. In New York there are reported to be about 9000 bales in the hands of the growers. The Waterville (N. Y.) Times of March 6, has the following: 'There seems to be more activity in the hop market during the past week, but perhaps it is a last exertion, a sort of dying effort, with but 121 bales left in the town at this writing, the purchasing ability of the buyer is certainly limited. Last week Charles Curtis sold 70 bales at 7 cents, which was reported Friday, and since then Thomas Price sold 22 bales at 9 cents, C. M. Wickwire 17 at 8 cents and Henry Shoemaker 63 at 9 cents.'
