Canyon Creek Miner Shot.

ROSEBURG, Or., March 19.—A mining man named Coats was shot by some one concealed on the hillside above his mining claim, about eight miles southwest of Canyonville, near the head of the right fork of Canyon creek. It is thought a man named Monroe did the shooting. There were three men present—Coats and another, and the one that did the shooting. Coats was shot in the side, the ball coming out above the hip. Word was sent to Canyonville for a doctor, who has not returned. It seems that there has been some trouble between the men for some time about their mining claims. They were formerly from Cottage Grove.

The Mohair Pool.

Geo. A. Houck, the well-known rancher and goat breeder, who is interested in the forming of a pool of the mohair grown in Benton and Lane counties, stated to a GUARD reporter this morning that the project is receiving favorable consideration among goat men. Mr. Houck expects to have all the mohair placed in the pool at the two shipping places designated, Eugene and Corvallis, so that he can guarantee to purchasers the delivery of the product as well as assure the growers that their money will be forthcoming. A RAT BOUNTY.

Astoria's Precaution Against the Bubonic Plague.

ASTORIA, Or., March 19.—At the meeting of the city council this evening Chairman Brix, of the board of health, introduced an ordinance authorizing the chief of police to pay a bounty of 5 cents each for all rats caught with traps in the city limits during the next 30 days, and appropriating \$50 for that purpose. No action was taken on the ordinance this evening, as it appropriates money, but Mayor Bergman has issued a call for a special meeting tomorrow night, when the vote will be taken. The measure is intended as a precaution against a possible epidemic of the plague, and nearly every councilman has expressed himself as favoring its passage.
