CALEB POWERS

Held for Complicity in Murder of Goebel.

DEFENSE INTRODUCED NO TESTIMONY.

FRANKFORT, March 27.—Caleb Powers, republican secretary of state, on trial for complicity in the murder of Wm. Goebel, was bound over today, after a preliminary examination which included many exciting and dramatic scenes.

When the defendant's attorneys asked for adjournment yesterday to arrange for witnesses in his behalf it was thought that much could be expected from that side. On the opening of court this morning ex-Governor Brown and Judge George Denny, attorneys for the defense, announced that no testimony would be introduced by them, and Judge Moore thereupon issued the order binding the defendant over.

PARIS EXPOSITION.

PARIS, March 27.—The exposition will open on April 14, and the opening ceremonies will be something grand. Large crowds of strangers are in the city, and before the opening occurs Paris will be packed.

THE RUSSIAN SQUADRON.

BRITISH ADVANCE

Is Checked By Reason of Heavy Rains.

BOER WOMEN NOT IN ARMY.

LONDON, March 27.—Heavy rains in all parts of South Africa have delayed advances on the part of the British troops, although the same is contemplated as soon as practicable.

At the headquarters of the Boer and British armies it is denied that Boer women were wounded in the trenches at Tugela, or that any women were on the firing line as soldiers. This report was quite prevalent several weeks ago, and this is the first authentic denial of the same.

SIUSLAW MAIL CONTRACT.

Eli Bangs Resumes the Route Under the Kentucky Firm.

The trouble over the Siuslaw mail contract has been settled. It will be remembered that some time ago Eli Bangs, sub-contractor under Chilton, Yaden & Company, of London, Kentucky, refused to take the mail out, as the Kentucky firm had not settled with him for six months. Postmaster McCormack, of this city, at once notified the U. S. postmaster-general, and was ordered to place special delivery of the mail along this route until the matter could be adjusted, and for the past month Mr. Bangs has been carrying the mail under special orders from Postmaster McCormack.

In the meantime the matter has been adjusted between contractors and subcontractor and today Mr. Bangs resumed the work of his former contract. It frequently happens that these Eastern contractors are negligent in attending to their contracts in the Western states, and needless delays often occur. It is to be hoped that this evil in the postal system can in some manner be checked. The Kentucky firm will, under its bond with the government, stand the expense of the extra work during the settlement of the difficulty.

Holt's G. O. P. Side Show.

SALEM, March 24.—The state central committee, of the aggregation variously known as the middle-landers, anti-fusion and Holt-Vedder factions is in session at the city hall today. The attendance this morning was decidedly slim, less than 20 being present, and not all of them delegates. The invitation was to all populists who were unalterably opposed to fusion, and several local populists were there as onlookers.

After dinner the report of the committee on order of business was adopted. The call for a state convention consisting of 214 delegates to meet at Portland April 11th, to nominate a state ticket; also a district convention at Albany April 11th.

At Hampton has been selected as grand marshal for Bryan day, and will appoint aides.

FRUIT CROP SAFE.

Will Be No Late Cold Rains, Says Colonel Dosch.

Colonel Dosch, secretary of the State Horticultural Board, is authority for the opinion that there will be no late cold rains this spring. He gives as his reason for so believing that there is very little snow in the mountains. There may be considerable frost, but not enough, he thinks, to greatly injure the fruit crop. There is but one foot of snow at Government Camp, Mount Hood, and scarcely any in the Cascades.
