A NEW POLITICAL PROPHECY.

The many Eugene friends who have witnessed the growth of Sam Goldsmith from the puling infant to a full grown pushing "drummer" man are surprised. They never entertained any other idea than that Sam's ability lay solely in the direction of selling groceries, and making love to sundry "drummer-struck" maidens along the line of his travels. Politically, Mr. Goldsmith says, he and the populists and democrats are not as aggressive as in the past, and in fact in those organizations and the principles they represent, is on the decrease. The visit to Oregon and the speaking of Col. V. J. Bryan, the democratic leader, says Mr. Goldsmith, will not be sufficient to renew the spirit of activity and indifference that is manifested by the disciples of the white metal. Continuing, Mr. Goldsmith expressed his honest conviction that the electors of Oregon at the November election will most unqualifiedly endorse the administration, and the treatment and disposition that has been made of all the great issues of the day. He reports that the silver craze in this state has been relegated to the graveyard of political delusions, and says Oregon's people are too progressive to entertain, seriously for any time, the anti-imperialistic theory.

Sam's observations may have great weight in Salem and other suburban localities, but right here in Eugene and Lane county, where he is so well known, his "honest conviction" as to the trend of political opinion will not be rapturously received, even by his brethren who worship at the gold standard McKinley altar. Yet Sam may find consolation for lack of credence in his old home by reflecting that "a prophet is not without honor save in his own country and home."

Extracts From Trade Journal.

As a result meeting of the New York Retail Grocers Union, a communication was ordered sent to several manufacturers, protesting against their system of rebate on quantity purchases. The following extracts convey an accurate idea of the case presented: "Your companies see fit to give to the large dealers a commission or discount which is denied to the small dealer, because he can not buy the prescribed amount. The retail grocery business, as conducted at the present time, involves an expense of from 12 to 14 per cent. The average profit is only from 10 to 20 per cent on all honest goods, thus leaving the proprietor only a net profit of from 3 to 5 per cent. Now if the larger dealer can buy from 10 to 15 per cent less, he can undersell the small dealer about 7 per cent, and still have a good profit."
