"Hon. R. S. Sheridan returned home this morning, having accompanied Mr. Bryan as far as Walla Walla, Wash. He met the distinguished gentleman at the state line, and states that the reception accorded him in Western and Eastern Oregon was enthusiastic, and there was no exception at any town. At Salem, ten thousand people heard him speak and at other points the crowds were proportional to the size of the towns. At Walla Walla, a downpour of rain compelled the crowd to go indoors and the two largest halls in the city were able to accommodate only a small portion of the crowd that turned out to hear the speech, Bryan speaking in both halls."

FAVORABLE.—Medford Mail: "Eugene has under consideration the construction of a linseed mill. Flax will pay better than wheat, and it is less expensive to handle. The farmer can retain the fiber, as only the seed will be used at the mill. If Dakota and Idaho farmers can ship flax to the Portland mill at a profit, there is certainly no reason why it cannot be shipped from here to Eugene, or even Portland, if better prices could be obtained there. The heavy black land of the valley is specially adapted to flax raising, and since it is a more profitable crop than wheat, there is no reason why valley farming should not include this product. Once farmers fully prove that the culture of flax will pay, and commence to raise it in earnest, there will be no trouble to get a mill here."

STREET RAILWAY

W. B. Dennis, of Spokane, Purchased the Property.

WILL CONTINUE TO BE OPERATED.

"I probably have an elephant on my hands," said W. B. Dennis, the Spokane mining operator, to a Guard reporter today.

Mr. Dennis is operating the Black Butte Mining Company's property, east of Cottage Grove on a bond, and came to this city to purchase some iron rails from Meers. Holden Bros, of the Eugene Street railway, to use in his development work at the mines. The visit resulted in more. Mr. Dennis is now owner of the Eugene Street Railway, its track, rolling stock, franchise, mules and all appurtenances belonging thereto, which fact occasioned the opening remark.

Just what Mr. Dennis will do with the property is undecided at present. He will continue to operate it for a time, at least, as it now stands. Mr. Dennis could give no hint as to what the future would have in store for the property. He thinks that by fixing up the roadbed and giving an improved service, the line as it now stands will pay better returns. So far as any future operation of the road is concerned Mr. Dennis would say nothing, as he does not know himself, having purchased the property almost on the spur of the moment.

Mr. Dennis is a mining man, and a busy one at that, so that the operating of street railways is something new to him. He has stated however, that if power could be secured reasonably, a line from Eugene through Fairmount to Springfield might be a good investment. Or it might be that he will find it necessary to discontinue the service altogether.

Speaking further regarding the matter, Mr. Dennis stated that in reaching out by small motor or electric lines for trade adjacent to a growing city, such as Eugene, the business men and capitalists of the city who are directly interested should own and control the transportation ways, thus insuring interested attention to detail.

Mr. Dennis will tear up the track on Willamette street south of Eleventh and ship to the mines together with the other rails stored at the "power" house, to use in his development work.

The ownership of the street car system changes hands after 11 years operation. The Meers, Holden have had many things to contend with in the conduct of the line, but the operation of the system has probably been all that the receipts would justify, and even better. Extensions to the line and improved service would, in all likelihood, result in a revenue-paying road. The people would hail with delight the knowledge that Eugene and Springfield might be connected with a motor line, for its advantage is plainly evident.

ENJOYED THEMSELVES.—At the close of the business season last evening members of the Eugene Hook & Ladder Company partook of a feast served to them at The Banquet. The event was a very pleasant one in the annals of the company, and was appreciated by all attendant.

DEAD AT YAQUINA.—Tuesday's Albany Herald: "O. C. Coffin, an employe in the car shop of the G. & E. at Yaquina, died there Sunday, of pneumonia and spinal meningitis, and his body was brought in a special train to Toledo yesterday afternoon for burial. A nine-year-old son died only a few days ago. He leaves a wife, who has the sincere sympathy of many. Mr. Coffin was born in Eugene and lived here a number of years."
