CITY ORDINANCES.

ORDINANCE No. 9. A SPECIAL ORDINANCE TO BUILD SIDEWALKS ON CEDAR, LAUREL AND LARCH STREETS, AND ON ELM AVENUE IN THE TOWN OF FOREST GROVE OREGON.

THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF FOREST GROVE DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: Sec. 1. That a sidewalk shall be built in accordance with the provision of Ordinance No. eight, and approved Nov. 13th 1874. Commencing at the northeast corner of lot No. 3 in block No. 35 on Cedar street, thence west on the south side of said street to Laurel street, thence north on the west side of said street to Elm Avenue, thence west on the south side of said avenue to the end of the street crossing on Oak Avenue, passing the lots and parts of lots numbered and owned as named in section three in this ordinance.

\$29 00; lots no. one and two in block no. 22 owned by F. W. Chandler, and assessed \$38 00; lot no. one in block no. 7, owned by Melch Johnson, and assessed \$29 00; lots no. 2 and three in block no. 7, owned by Steven Harris, and assessed \$86 20; 75 feet by 100 feet in N. E. corner lot no. 2 in block no. 6, owned by A. Hinman and assessed \$11 35; 50 feet by 100 feet in lot no. 2 in block no. 6, owned by H. O. Hyde, and assessed \$7 00; 108 feet by 200 feet in lot no. 3 in block no. 21 owned by Perry Keeler and assessed \$16 25; 94 feet by 200 feet in lot no. 2 and lot no. 2 in block no. 21 owned by W. A. Geiger, and assessed \$42 20; lots no. 3 and two in block no. 20, owned by Benj. Cornelius, and assessed \$58 00; lot no. 3 in block no. 19 owned by J. B. Hutch, and assessed \$29 00; lot no. 2 in block no. 19, owned by John Powers, and assessed \$29 00. All of the above described lots are situated in the Town of Forest Grove, county of Washington, and State of Oregon, as described on the Town Plat.

Sec. 4. If in thirty days from the date of the publication of notice of the requirements of this Ordinance the assessment against any of the lots, or parts of lots, or any part thereof, remains unpaid, it shall be the duty of the Recorder to proceed against such lots or parts of lots, and sell them in accordance with the provisions of sections eight and nine of the amendments to the Town Charter, and approved Oct. 29th 1874.

Sec. 5. The Street Commissioner shall have supervision of the construction of all sidewalk walks, and when a person owning a lot or lots or parts of lots on the line of the hereinbefore mentioned sidewalks shall have constructed or caused to be constructed a sidewalk or walks, in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, then the Street Commissioner shall accept such walk or walks, in liquidation of the assessment made against the lot or lots of said owner and shall give such owner a receipt stating the acceptance of such sidewalk.

Sec. 6. All walks that are constructed before the expiration of the ten days notice required by the provisions of the amendments to the Town Charter, and which are not less than four feet wide, and in the main conform to the requirements of this ordinance shall be accepted by the Street Commissioner in liquidation of the assessment against the lot or lots or part of lot abutting upon said walk.
