John T. Scott's Fifty Years' Absence.

We publish the following from the Mount Pulaski (Ill.) Star concerning John T. Scott of Forest Grove, who is now on a visit to see his relatives and the land of his birth. Mr. Scott like, many other Western men who have lived all their lives on the frontier, had no advantage of early education, nevertheless he is a strong and earnest thinker; and if he had had the itch for office, and the desire for applause, and the "gift of gab," he might have been a leading man on this Coast.

John T. Scott (better known as Tucker Scott.) is visiting his nephew and niece, Mr. K. E. Turley and Mrs. S. C. Beam, of this place, after an absence of fifty years. He is the only uncle of Mr. Turley and Mrs. Beam now living, and it is not only a treat and pleasure to entertain their mother's brother, but a blessing.

Uncle Scott's physiognomy portrays a picture of advanced age and health and his physical form will avowly support two hundred and forty-five pounds. Although now in his sixty-seventh year, he would pass for a man of only fifty summers, and one would set his expectancy down for thirty years hence.

He removed from Tazewell county twenty-three years ago, and settled in Washington Territory, crossing the plains and mountains with an ox team, being six months on the route. After living but a few months in that Territory, he removed to Forest Grove, Oregon, and has been living there ever since. He has twenty-four grandchildren around him at his occidental home, and inherits the name "uncle" from a goodly number that he never has had the pleasure of meeting. He has been visiting his two sisters, one in Kansas and the other in Iowa. He also has a sister in Asia as a missionary, who has been there these many years.

He cannot at present recall to memory any of the "old settlers" who are living, except James Capps, James and Bobbio Downing, and they were boys together.

He has raised quite a noted family; among them is Mrs. A. J. Duniway, who has a "world-wide" reputation as a lecturer, and is editress of the New Northwest, published at Portland, Oregon, and has a special to the Centennial Celebration. One of his sons is visiting Washington City at present on official duty who is Collector of Customs.

It is quite a novel treat to hear Uncle Tucker relate the antiquated history of this country fifty years ago and how the wolves and other wild animals used to roam at will over this mundane spot. He likes Oregon much better than Illinois, and is frank to say it is a mining country instead of an agricultural one, and cannot be excelled for scenery. He professes to reach his home again by the 20th of April, and we think it will be a long time before another pilgrim will enjoy the regale of our breezes after an absence of "fifty years."
