

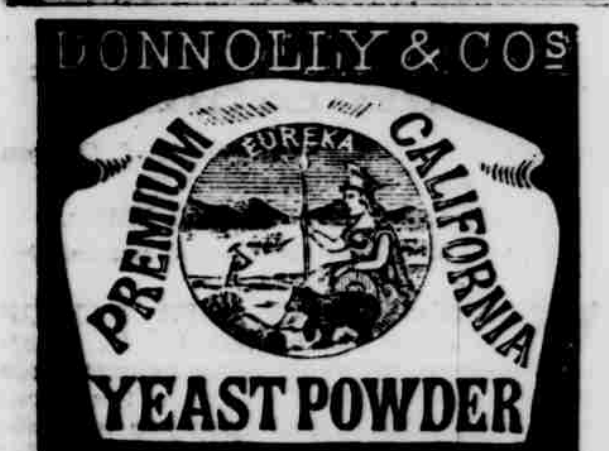
OREGON ITEMS.

Some of the farmers about Harrisburg have got done sowing wheat, but there are others who will not be able to finish sowing all they intend to, on account of the season being so late. Feed is scarce and some farmers are working their teams on grass.

The Statesman says: "Some time ago, members of the medical faculty of Willamette University addressed a letter to Governor Grover, offering to perform all the offices of penitentiary physician for a merely nominal sum—\$300 a year."

The Record says: Articles were filed with the Secretary of State on the 24th, of the Coos Bay and Umpqua Valley Railroad; capital stock three millions of dollars; eastern terminus Roseburg; western terminus the navigable waters of Isthmus Slough. The new county of Lake, which was formed out of the eastern portion of Jackson and the southern portion of Wasco counties, is suffering from the lack of proper mail facilities. That county is fast filling up with settlers, and their wants in this respect are becoming more pressing every day. Some of the settlers, of whom there are 250 in Summer and Silver Lake valleys, have to go ninety miles for their mail.



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
