PACIFIC UNIVERSITY AND TUALATIN ACADEMY.

The trustees of the Pacific University and Tualatin Academy met at Portland last week.

President Marsh has decided to go East with a view to obtain, if possible, additional funds.

Prof. Condon was appointed Prof. of Natural History and Prof. Collier transferred to the chair of Mathematics.

McMinnville gave \$19,000 to the R. R. Company to locate a station at that place and false to their promises, having got the money Holladay & Co., fools as well as scoundrels, located the station three miles away from the town in order to ruin its business and tear it down.

It is due to him that the Institution is under the control of no sect or party, but is founded on the same broad and distinctive plan of the best institutions of learning in the East.

The Grove owes its present prosperous condition also to these institutions. The College and Academy have made it. Not centrally located, though a beautiful site it would have been a village now of two dozen families without these institutions.
