A Rope of Women's Hair

A dispatch concerning the Mountain Meadow massacre states that there is a rope in the possession of certain parties which was made of the hair of the women murdered at the massacre. It would be a fitting termination to this awful horror if Brigham Young, the old devil, and his principal Mormon inns could be swung off into hell on this rope. It is a shame, a burning shame, that for eighteen years the bones of a hundred and twenty men, women and children have bleached on the burning sands of Utah, gnawed by the wolves, vomited over by buzzards and insulted by the red devils of the plains. Shame enough, one would think, that the festering, rotten and dreadful system of polygamic prostitution and incest should be ignored and winked at by the Government, but that a hundred women and children should be raped, mutilated and murdered without any attempt until now to punish the offenders is a cowardly, dastardly and damnable crime. Had it been any other Government than the United States, these villains would have been punished instantly. But this is a country of "red tape" justice, where great rascals grow fat and poor or unimportant men are prosecuted to the extent of the law. The people ought to have appealed to Judge Lynch long ago from the political and unconscionable courts of law and dealt swift, red-handed justice on the licentious old reprobates and hypocrites who run the leper-houses of the Latter Day Devils in Utah.

A Compromise.

Last Thursday the suit of the State of Oregon ex rel. Gaston et al. vs. Pen Holladay et al., was brought before Judge Shattuck at Portland, and on Saturday was postponed until the first of September. And since the postponement we learn that the representatives of Mr. Holladay offer the new Directors the following compromise: That Holladay & Co. will pay off certain debts of the Company for which Mr. Gaston is responsible, put in switches and build stations at Hillsboro and Forest Grove, and pay the attorneys' fees in the pending suit, if the suit shall be withdrawn.

Now since the principal complaint of Washington county against Holladay's management of the road is because he has refused stations to the Grove and Hillsboro, the people of this county would be satisfied with such a compromise. We would suggest to Gaston et al., however, that if they wish to secure permanent stations at this place and Forest Grove that they should have the agreement so drawn that the Company cannot stop taking freight or passengers at their own pleasure.

Andrew Johnson.

Andrew Johnson died at his daughter's home in Tennessee last Saturday, July 31st. In 1828 he was elected Alderman of the village of Greenville; in 1843 was elected to Congress where he served in the capacity of Representative and Senator up to March 3d, 1862; was elected Vice-President of the U. S. in 1864, and by the assassination of Lincoln in 1865 became President.

Last winter he was elected U. S. Senator from Tennessee as an Independent Democrat.

Andrew Johnson never went to school a day in his life. To his honor he was never accused of corruption even by his bitterest opponents. He was a failure as a President, but was an honest man which is more than can be said for many of his enemies.

Messrs. EAGLETON, W. D. Pittenger and self went on a berry hunt last Friday to Quick's mill. It rained on us up there by way of variety. We returned Saturday with some berries and our fingers full of briars. The season for berries is done at Quick's mill and everywhere in the valley and foot-hills. It is said there are a great many blackberries on the summit of the Nehalem mountain on the Quick's mill route. They are just beginning to get ripe up there and will be in season for a month yet.

A German Settlement.

For a fortnight or more dense volumes of smoke have been rising from the Portland hills and away in a line toward the west, and now so dense has become the vapor that the forests and mountain tops in that direction are scarcely visible. This smoke arises from the burning of "slashing" and clearing in the German settlement in that hilly and forest region. Most people on coming into this county, and in fact most of the people living in the county, are not aware of the extent and progress of this German settlement made in the foothills to the north and northeast of Hillsboro, because it is among the woods and hills and is shut out from our view. This settlement of hardy pioneers who have literally hewed their way into the dense forests of the mountains, extends from where the Washington county road crosses the Portland hills, to Quick's mill on a branch of Dairy Creek, a distance of twelve or fifteen miles. All along this distance, more or less settled, the Germans have squatted on the hill-sides and are making ceaseless war on the forests of fir that have so long daunted the courage of the pioneers from the "Far West." Year by year they keep widening the settled belt. They are planting orchards, vineyards and fruit shrubbery; cutting cordwood, burning coal, raising stock and making butter and cheese; and all making a comfortable living, and are gradually clearing up their farms. In ten years they will be the wealthiest class of farmers in the county.

The land in this settlement is better than is generally supposed. Many judge it by the poor fir timber lands in the valley flats, which is a mistake. The soil is warmer, more friable and deeper than most of the prairie land on the Tualatin Plains, and with proper cultivation will last as long as the hills themselves. For fruit-growing the valley lands will not compare with it, for the situation is sheltered from the winds that sometimes blow strong and chilly blasts over the valley below. And it does not suffer from dry weather as much as the valley, because the forests and mountains draw the clouds and moisture. On this account it is also good for grain crops.

This region is not so heavily timbered as many think. There is a belt of very thick timber around the edge of the valley, but back on the foot-hills the timber is not so thick and is of a quality that is easier to manufacture than the timber in the valley.

These Germans are our most law-abiding and industrious citizens and so are valuable to us in more than a material or productive sense. We hope those Germans who have already settled in our county will persuade their friends to come, for there is room here for hundreds of homes as good as those we have just described.

The Turf.

We have interviewed Mr. Thompson, the horse trainer, who is now training several horses on the Washington County Fair grounds, and from him we learn the following facts concerning the horses that are already here and those that will attend the Fair this fall:

"Mowich" by "Norwich"; "Ali" by "Jack Minor"; a four year old, "Red Mariah," also by "Jack Minor"; and a two-year old filly unnamed, by the horse "Napa," by Norfolk, dam by Jack Minor; all owned by W. G. Scoggin. These horses are already on the Grounds training.

All of Reed's trotting horses, Clydesdale stock, six in number, led by "Autocrat," will enter.

J. F. Bybee will be here with the celebrated trotting horse, "Foster," "Captain Jack," "George Glen," "Ryestraw," "Oregon," a two-year old colt by "Doctor Lindsley," a brown filly name unknown and a bay stallion three-year old, name unknown.

Mr. Masgrove of Sauvie's island will enter his running horses "Frank Welch" and "Norway." James Welch of Multnomah Co. will enter four or five trotting horses.

Loot Lindsay also of Multnomah Co. will be here with "Mark Twain," and other trotting horses.

Johnson Basket, of Polk county, will enter several horses, among which we name "Beantrot," a four year old stallion; "Napa," a stallion, and some of his fine two-year and three-year old colts.

Geo. Coggan, of La Grande, will enter his noted horse "Ossolin," and another fine running horse, name unknown, but imported from California this Spring; also a span of fine trotting horses, four-year old.

Geo. Ross of Walla Walla will be here with several fast trotting horses. Dan Young of the Dalles will enter his fine running horse "Bigham," and some other horses.

Also Bill White of Multnomah will be here with his running horses. Mr. Thompson informs us that the track is in good condition for training. The outside of the track is in good order for running or trotting and the inside is in order for "working."

If all the horses come that are reported the turf will be better represented in this county at the coming Fair than ever known before.
