Mormon Intrigues.

The Times' Salt Lake correspondent professes to disclose the details of an intrigue under which the Mormons are arranging to leave Utah and by shrewd manipulation get control of New Mexico and thus steal into the Union under the bill passed for its admission as a State. The correspondence states that the Mormons have secretly bought up immense tracts of land consisting of old Spanish grants at a nominal price. Several Mormon elders have gone there and have been proselyting the Indians. If the scheme succeeds it will turn New Mexico over to Brigham Young, when the long sought for kingdom of Mormon will be firmly established under the Constitution and in the Union.

The Locks at the Cascades.

The Senate Committee on transportation routes to the sea board have unanimously agreed to Senator Mitchell's bill, which passed the House, appropriating \$150,000 toward the construction of a canal and locks at the Cascades of the Columbia river. 
