## LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

### Religious Notices.

**REV. FATHER BLANCHETT** will hold divine services at the Catholic Church to-morrow, at the usual hour.

**AN ATTEMPTED MURDER.**—On Saturday last, while Senator Fay was seated in the Bella Union Saloon reading a newspaper, with his back to the door, V. S. Ralls entered and without a word drew his pistol, struck the end of the plate of the trigger guard, driving the plate back and disabling the weapon, the parties being so close together that the powder burst Mr. Fay's fingers and face. The ball split on the end of the plate, a part going through Mr. Fay's coat, pocket book and striking the second rib on the right side, inflicting a painful flesh wound; while the concussion of the blow on the pistol caused it to inflict painful wounds on the hands and fingers. Ralls immediately upon firing retreated to the street, and fired two more shots into the saloon at Mr. Fay, who was virtually disarmed, happily, however, inflicting no other damage. A more deliberate attempt at murder was never perpetrated in this State. We understand the proper steps have been taken to bring the attempted murderer to justice.

**THE telegram to the Herald and Bulletin** in reference to the Fay-Ralls affair was inexcusably false in several particulars. There was no remark made by Ralls in reference to seducing his daughter. That was manufactured from whole cloth.

**FOR STREET COMMISSIONER.**—R. S. Dunlap announces himself in another column of today's issue as a candidate for the office of Street Commissioner. The Sargent is well known and will make an energetic and useful officer.

**TOWN ELECTION.**—The election of officers for this town—Marshal, Recorder, Treasurer, Street Commissioner and Trustees—occurs next Tuesday. Judges of election, Messrs. Fiddler, Hyde and Reames; Clerks, Messrs. Kahler and Huffer.

**BOUND OVER.**—James D. Fay and V. S. Ralls were each bound over yesterday, before James E. Wade, in the sum of \$2,000, to keep the peace.

**DISTRICT COURT—SISKIYOU COUNTY, CAL.**—Hon. A. M. Roberg, District Judge, presiding. The following is the summary of business transacted since our last issue:

**Friday, Feb. 24th.**—The people vs. Wm. Williams. Motion for new trial overruled, to which defendants' counsel excepted, and enter a motion for arrest of judgment on the verdict, on the ground that it does not substantially conform to requirements of sections 237 and 238 of the criminal practice act of California, in this: The indictment does not contain a statement of the acts constituting the offence, or the particular circumstances of the act charged. The motion was overruled, and defendant duly excepted.

The defendant was then addressed by the Court, as follows:

**Wm. Williams—stand up.** An indictment was found against you, Wm. Williams, by the Grand Jury of Siskiyou County, on the 13th day of May, 1870, charging you with the crime of murder in killing John Toddhunter on or about the 8th day of May, 1870, at Cottonwood, in this county. Upon your being arraigned on said indictment you plead not guilty. Upon this plea you were tried by a jury of your countrymen, who rendered a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree against you. Have you any legal cause to show why judgment should not now be pronounced against you?

No legal cause being shown, the Court rendered the following judgment:

It is ordered, adjudged and decreed by the Court, that you, Wm. Williams, suffer the punishment of death, and that the Sheriff of this county detain you in custody until such time as shall be specified in a warrant signed by the Judge of this Court, and attested by the Clerk, under the seal of this Court.

It is further ordered, adjudged and decreed, that the Sheriff of this (Siskiyou) county cause this judgment to be executed at the time specified in said warrant, and that the said punishment of death be inflicted upon you by hanging you, Wm. Williams, the defendant, by the neck, until you be dead. Such is the judgment of the Court.—*Tribune Journal.*
