Peace Jubilee.

A meeting was held at the Court House in this city, March 13, 1871, for the purpose of making arrangements for the proper celebration of the declaration of peace between Germany and France, Mr. John Cimbusky presiding, and Thos. Paulsen Secretary.

Resolved, That the declaration of peace between Germany and France be celebrated by a torchlight procession and by a ball, and that any surplus of funds which may accrue therefrom, be donated for the benefit of the German Sanitary Fund.

Resolved, That the day selected for the celebration be the 4th of April, 1871.

Resolved, That the President be authorized to appoint a committee of Arrangements of five, to superintend this matter, and to appoint sub-committees if necessary. The following gentlemen were appointed as said committee: John Bilger, Isaac Sachs, Luns Hering, Morris Baum and Thomas Paulsen.

On motion, the President was added to the Committee of Arrangements.

On motion, the meeting, adjourned until called again by order of the President.
