Proceedings of the Board of Trustees.

[REPORTED FOR THE TIMES.]

Monday evening, March 20th.—The Board met at the appointed hour. Present, N. Fisher, L. H. Ziegler, Jno. Bilger; absent, President Wilson and Jas. Howard. A. Fisher was chosen President, pro tem, and called the meeting to order. The minutes of the two last meetings were read and approved. The official bonds of town officers were presented and approved, viz: Recorder's bond, \$500, sureties, C. C. Beekman and N. Lingel; Treasurer, H. Pape, bond, \$1,000, sureties, Jos. We terer and I. Sachs; Marshal, Jas. McDaniel, bond \$1,000, W. H. S. Hyde and I. Sachs; Street Commissioner, R. S. Dunlap, bond, \$1,000, sureties, T. G. Reames and Jacob Ish. P. Buschey's bill for \$255.54 was ordered paid. H. Pape's bill, \$22.50, and Geo. Seaman's bill, \$111.50 were taken from the table and referred to Finance Committee. The Treasurer's report was taken from the table and referred to the same committee. Street Commissioner Dunlap made a report on the condition of the streets; the report says: "Thanks to the liberality of the former Board and the energy and fidelity of my predecessors, the streets are in better condition than ever before;" and recommended that Third Street be opened out, and a bridge built on R. G. Gulch crossing; and proposes to improve Oregon street, south from Wether's brewery. The report after reading was laid over. Recorder presented his fee bill for past year, \$74.90, referred to usual committee. Mr. Ziegler submitted an ordinance to require all licenses to be paid in coin; read and referred. The Board adjourned to Thursday evening, March 30th inst.

LAND GRABBING.—Our county has been the scene of great industry in land matters, for the last two weeks. Parties are engaged in every direction surveying, hunting stakes, and then rushing frantically into town with their "numbers". One gentleman has a survey, or employed by the month and runs his own lines, and the other fellows "go and play coons or him" thus; after his surveyor finds the corners and has struck out for a new tract, they quietly take the "numbers" and rush into town and enter the land. The consequence is that the man with the surveyor, when he comes back, will find all his valuable land entered by other parties. The map book in the Clerk's office is almost worn out by its almost constant use, for the last few days, and the Land Office is reaping a harvest. We learn from good authority that the only land left is the lot of Mount McLaughlin, and the island in Sunken Lake. An enterprising party has determined to ascend the former in a few days, to locate a claim in order to furnish the S. F. market with ice, "when the railroad comes."

HIGH WATER.—From the meagre intelligence gleaned from the North, we judge that our web-footed brethren are having rather a moist and muddy time of it. It is said the waters are higher than they have been since the memorable floods of '62. Our latest Portland exchanges bear date the 12th inst., and we only received our Eugene exchanges of the 18th inst., Wednesday night. The mails are probably on the "lower road" somewhere between the North Umpqua and Albany.

SPRING FIGHTS.—The Spring fights have commenced. The past week has been particularly in exercises in the many art, both in town and at Ashland. Not only the weapons Nature provides, but iron poker and clubs have been used. There has been some blood lost, a good deal of headache, but no bones broken. At last accounts all was "quiet on the Potomac."

CORRECTION.—Last week we mentioned the fact that a meeting to organize a Jockey Club would be held in Jacksonville on the 21st April. This is a mistake. The meeting will be held on the 1st. We hope a future notice will be had. The meeting to organize the County Agricultural Society, it will be remembered, will be held on the first of May.

LATE RAINS.—A greater rain fall has been had within the past ten days than during the whole of last winter. Miners are industriously at work at Willow Springs, Jackson, A. pegate, Jackson creek, Rich Gulch and other diggings, making the most of the small quantity of water vouchsafed them.

RATES REDUCED.—Winjen & Helms say that they are going to reduce the price of drinks on the 1st prox. They say further, that although they are going to do this on "All F. of Day," they are not going to fool anybody in the quality of the liquor. It will be the same they sell at two bits.

PERSONAL.—Postal Agent Underwood passed through town last Thursday night. He gave us great encouragement with regard to the establishment of the mail route to Butte, etc. He informs us that his visit extended as far as Wabash, and that the westward bound cars are filled with emigrants for Oregon, many of them in good circumstances. He says the rush for this State is unprecedented. Three steamers loaded with emigrants for Oregon left San Francisco during last week.

As the officers of the California and Oregon railroad are all in the Eastern States at present, it is not known what their real calculations are in pushing it through to the Oregon line this summer, but there is no doubt but what a good piece will be built at any rate.—Yreka Journal.

The Statesman says: T. H. Cann, Esq., Agent of the Board of State Land Commissioners has made out one hundred and fifty deeds to purchasers of State and School Lands since about the first of January. This business is being attended to as fast as possible.

The Oregonian learns that on or about the 1st of April, the Democratic Era will make its appearance at East Portland. Rumor connects the name of U. E. Hicks with it, publisher and editor. The paper is to be a weekly and of course, Democratic in politics.

The State Journal says: We have had no mails from the north since Monday, and none from the south, for several days. This deprives us of our State exchanges and also of usual telegraphic news.
