SHATING AFFRAY AT ASHIAND .- On Saturder morning, 25th ult., about 8 o'clock, A D. Burton fired four shots at Stephen Booth, at Ashland, inflicting a serious wound in the upper part of the chest, the ball passing entirely through and lodging in the muscles of the back, from whence it was subseequently taken; another ball entered the excist, and following the course of the bone, Rodged in the muscles above the elbow; this Ball has not yet been found. An examinastion of Burton was had before A. V. Gillett, J. P., on the 27th ult., during which Dr. Greenman, the medical attendant of the wounded man, testified that the ball passed through the neck a little to the left of the upper part of the sternum and, dividing the windpipe, appeared at the back a little to the right of the spine; but that Booth can use his voice. The testimony further developed the fact that Booth had brutally beaten the Def't three or four times the night before, and had uttered threats against the life of Def't. The defence set up was that the shooting was done in self defence. The Justice he d the prisoner to answer under \$1,000 bon ls, the following named gentlemen becom ne his sureties : John P.
