FLOUR FOR YREKA.—Jesse Gage started for Yreka on last Monday with 5,400 pounds of flour contributed by the citizens of Jackson county to the relief of sufferers by the late fire. Tommy Thomas started the next day with 2,000 lbs. more. We are pleased to be able to state in this connection that Mr. Thornton, of the Siskiyou wagon road, and Mr. Bell, of the Klamath ferry, remit the tolls on the wagon bound for Yreka on this charitable errand.

Big Bar.—We are informed that about one-half of Rogue river was turned into the works of the Big Bar company on Wednesday day, and the rest of water on Thursday. We are pleased to learn of the success of this enterprise, and hope the company will reap abundant reward for the toil and expense of their works. This has been one of the most extensive mining enterprises ever undertaken in this county, and we rejoice at its success.
