REPORT OF BRIDGE COMMISSIONERS.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of Jackson county:

We, the undersigned Commissioners, appointed by your honorable Board, at its last July session, for the purpose of making a personal examination of the bridge across Rogue river at Rock Point, and to give an opinion as to the safety of the said bridge for the public travel over the same, respectfully report as follows: That on Wednesday, the 26th day of July, having been first duly sworn to faithfully perform the duties of our said appointment, we proceeded to the said bridge, and after a careful examination of the same, we find the condition of said bridge as follows:

The first bent of the bridge next to the river on the south side thereof, is unsound, and we consider unsafe. We recommend that this bent be replaced with a new bent, or a false bent be placed on the side of the unsound one immediately.

The second and third bents from the river on the south side we find the cap on each bent to be unsound, and new caps should be substituted for the unsound ones.

The fourth bent from the river on the same side as the above, is new and in good condition.

On the north side of the river, the lower west post of the first bent of the bridge next to the river is decayed.

The next bent from the river on the north side thereof, is in a moderate good state of preservation.

The third bent from the river on the north side we found the caps to be decayed.

The fourth bent from the river on the same side as the above is in good condition.

We also found that a portion of the stringers were decayed and should be replaced by new ones.

We also found that the railing of the bridge was in a bad condition, and should be made more safe.

With these details we are brought to the conclusion that the bridge, in the condition we found it, is unsafe for public travel over it; but with the necessary repairs indicated by the report we are of the opinion that it would be safe for the public travel for sometime to come; but for how long a time we cannot determine.

BARN BURNED.—On Sunday last about 2 o'clock, P. M., J. H. Billenbrook's barn caught fire and was consumed, together with its contents, some 60 tons of hay. 
