HOW TO MAKE CUTTINGS GROW.

It has been ascertained that a cutting will develop roots sooner in moist sand than in rich soil. But the sand cannot maintain its growth for any length of time. To prepare pots for raising cuttings, they should be filled nearly to the brim with rich garden loam--dark and porous, not clayey and soggy; then pour in one inch in depth of scouring sand--sea sand will do as well as the yellow sand.

AN ACT TO PROTECT FAIR GROUND.

Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, as follows: Sec. 1. If any person shall put up any salubrious wagon on other carriage for the sale of spirituous or other liquors, or shall sell or give away any liquors whatsoever within the bounds of any ground selected and occupied as a place for holding any agricultural, horticultural, or mechanical fair or public exhibition, or within one mile and a half of such grounds, without the written permission of those having charge of the same, every person so offending shall, on conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, nor less than twenty dollars.
