HOW TO MAKE CUTTINGS GROW.

It has been ascertained that a cutting will develop roots sooner in moist sand than in rich soil. But the sand cannot maintain its growth for any length of time. To prepare pots for raising cut-tings, they should be filled nearly to the brim with rich garden loam-dark and porous, not clayey and soggy; then pour in one inch in depth of scouring sand— sea sand will do as well as the yellow sand. Wet this thoroughly, and place the cutting, from which all but the three motes its growth. Press the wet stem! firmly around the tiny stem. A great deal of your chance for success in raising in the middle of the pot. Set them away in a dark, warm place for twenty-four or thirty-six hours.
