**STAGE MATTERS.**—Col. E. F. Hooker, Superintendent of the Oregon & California Stage Company, passed through this place on his way north, last Monday, accompanied by Mr. Sanderson, one of the principal owners in the line. The stages now lie over eight hours at Oakland, as well as ten hours at this place, and travel is light.

**FREIGHT TEAMS.**—About half a dozen teams have arrived from Crescent City during the week. The drivers report snow on all the higher portions of the road, hence we may infer the teaming season is nearly at an end. The stores and warehouses of our merchants are filled to repletion with all kinds of goods for the winter trade.

**ACCIDENT.**—On Sunday morning last, as Mrs. Ammerman, of Phoenix, was riding to church with another lady in a buggy, the horse got frightened at a sack of flour which some teamster had dropped in the road, and ran away. The vehicle was overturned and both ladies thrown out, but neither of them sustained any serious injury, though both were considerably bruised.

## A SCIENTIFIC REBUKE.

ED. **PRISON BREAKING.**—An outbreak occurred at the County Jail in this place, on Tuesday evening last, under the following circumstances: The jailer, whose name is Howlett, went into the jail to give the prisoners their supper, about half past six o'clock. After they had eaten, he proceeded to lock them up for the night, and stooped down to pick up an iron used in fastening the door. Two of the four prisoners confined there, now jumped upon him and held him fast to the floor, while a third proceeded to rifle his person of his pistol and money. The Chinaman, Lui Shing, became alarmed and cried aloud, when one of the breakers knocked him down. The other three then let go of Howlett, and darted outside of the jail door and locked it upon him. They then broke for the woods, having each taken a blanket. Howlett was soon released by Deputy Sheriff Foudray, who dispatched riders in every direction in search of the fugacious gentry. Klippel telegraphed to the north and south in search of them, and used every means to close all avenues of escape, but up to last accounts no sign of them had been discovered, save that on that night some unknown person slept in the shavings in an old carpenter shop owned by Squire Berry, at the east end of town. The names of the escaped men are James Good, Julius Warner and Charles Morrell. We believe that James is far from being good; that Charles' behavior is very immoral; and that Julius' conduct should be a warning to wrong-doers. Sheriff Klippel offers \$100 reward for the capture of each of these "goners." Who will bring them back?

LATER.—Since the above was in type we learn, by a dispatch from Stephen Booth to Sheriff Klippel, that the members of the "Can't-get-away Club" have been captured. They were brought in from Ashland by a posse of armed citizens on Thursday evening, and re-installed in their former quarters as guests of the county. Too much credit cannot be given to our Sheriff and his deputies for their alacrity.

**THAT LECTURE.**—Sam Colver, the swamp land apostle, held forth to several dozen of his "mutual admiration society," at the Court House, on Tuesday evening last. His lecture amounted to nothing as an argument, and only contained a mass of absurd incongruities strung together without method or order. Well, Sam can go on making a fool of himself as long as he likes, for, in his own words, "if he don't do it, somebody else will."

**THE HOP.**—On Wednesday evening, the Jacksonville Dancing Club gave one of their select parties at Horne's Hall, which was well attended not only by the young folks of our town, but there were also visitors from Ashland and Manzanita. The fun lasted till midnight, and all went home in a state of serenity.

**AT COURT.**—The attendance at Circuit Court is very large, and considerable interest is manifested in various important suits.

**CIRCUIT COURT.**—The regular November term of the Circuit Court in and for Jackson county, commenced on Monday last. Hon. P. P. Prim, Circuit Judge, H. K. Hanna, Dist. Att'y, Henry Klippel, Sheriff, and S. J. Day, Clerk, in attendance. The following are the proceedings of the Court up to Friday evening: R. H. Moore vs. T. F. Floyd, Isaac Thompson William Newman, and Geo. S. Mathewson, remand from Supreme Court for new trial. Judgment for plaintiff for \$77.25 and costs.

Christian Kretzer was admitted to citizenship on the testimony of John Orth and Louis Herling.

Antoine Ullman was also admitted to citizenship on testimony of Messrs. Orth and Herling, as above.

John Monroe vs. A. M. Waddle. Defendant given leave until Tuesday to answer.

Reuben B. Perry and Daniel Hopkins, absent jurors, were excused for this term of court.

A true bill of indictment was returned against James Good, Charles Morrell and Julius Warner, for larceny.

State vs. Yan and Toy. Indictment dismissed, a true bill not being found.

James A. Cardwell, administrator of estate of Wallace A. Gridley, vs. James Hamlin. Motion to dissolve injunction be overruled.

State vs. Good, Morrell and Warner. Defendants plead guilty, and were remanded for sentence.

State vs. John Blattner. "Not a true bill," was returned.

State vs. John Griffin. "Not a true bill," was returned.

Gilliland vs. Burnett. Dismissed at cost of appellant.

Finch vs. Burnett. Dismissed at plaintiff's cost.

Ganger vs. Burnett. Same order. Nichols vs. Shelton. Same order. Badger vs. Wingfield. Continued for the term.

State vs. Hall; assault; defendant discharged from custody, on payment of costs.

Monroe vs. Waddle; continued for the term.

Dullman vs. Callan; continued for the term.

Taylor vs. Neatheimer; civil suit to recover damages; set for trial on Tuesday next.

Parker vs. Swindon; tried by jury; verdict for \$50 and costs.

True bills of indictment were returned against A. D. Burton, assault with intent to kill; Valentine S. Ralls, same.

Arch Crisman, assault with dangerous weapon; James Harris, same. Continued cases for arrest of parties.

State vs. Sis Brown; child murder; dismissed on account of absence of important witnesses.

State vs. Howe and Hayden; continued for term.

State vs. Joseph Wells; indictment for murder. Ordered that default be entered against sureties on bond.

The case of State vs. A. D. Burton was on trial all of Friday, and still undecided as we go to press.

**NOTICE TO WITNESSES IN CRIMINAL CASES.**—The attention of the witnesses in criminal cases is called to the following section of the XVIII chapter of the General Laws of Oregon:

SEC. 20. The county clerk must, on the application of a witness in a criminal action or proceeding, enter in a fee book, under the title of the action in which the witness was subpoenaed or recognized, the number of days such witness has attended, and the number of miles he has necessarily traveled in consequence of such subpoena or recognition, and shall swear such witness to the statement contained in such entry. The mileage and per diem of a witness in a criminal action or proceeding, shall be claimed as in this section provided, at the term of court which the witness attends, and not afterwards.

Witnesses failing to make immediate application as above, will lose their fees.
