ADVICE TO LOVERS OF PLANTS.

It is a common mistake, at this season of the year, says a writer in the Utica Herald, to dig up large geraniums, dump them in pots, and bring them at once into the hot, dry air of stove-heated parlors, to protect them from winter's frosts, which are now near at hand—at the same time hoping that the plants, thus suddenly taken from the cool soil and air, will retain all their out-door bloom and beauty.

Large geraniums, when removed from the borders to the pots, ought to be well trimmed back, regardless of their present or budding flowers. Superfluous roots, too, may sometimes be trimmed back if it is desirable to use small pots. Root trimming, however, must never be done without an adequate trimming of the branches. In digging up the plants it is not necessary that large masses of soil be left around the roots.

A good share may be left around the main stalk and roots, the excess being carefully removed, a little at a time. Some soft, dry earth should be prepared by sifting, so that when the plants are lifted into the pots, plenty of good mould can be put around the margin, and well worked down with a flat stick; this done, a thorough soaking will settle the mould into the interstices.

After potting and watering, the plants ought to be grouped together in a protected part of the garden, so that they may be conveniently covered with a shawl or blanket at night, if the weather is frosty. It is a good plan to keep the plants grouped together near the barn or woodshed, where they can be easily brought in at night, if it is likely to be very cold.

In this way house plants, of various kinds, can be kept about, in and out, till the end of fall. Plants thus treated will become hardy, grow stoutly, while their roots will conform to the new situation in the pots, and can then be brought into the house in a healthy condition. The best window exposure for plants is due east, never west, nor south-west, if it can be avoided. The temperature of the room would be better a little cool than too hot.
