FATAL ACCIDENT.—On April 26th, Wm. Chitwood, of Table Rock, was accidentally shot and fatally wounded by a revolver in the hands of Bruce Chitamon. Mr. Chitamon was engaged in unbreaching the weep, when it was discharged, the ball entering the abdomen of young Chitwood, and producing a wound of which he died forty-eight hours afterwards. Dr. Aiken was summoned, but the wounded man was beyond help. Young Chitwood was but nineteen years of age, and formerly resided in the Umpqua.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES.—The Board held an adjourned meeting last Tuesday evening, April 30th. Present: President Fisher, Linn and Helms; absent: Bilger and Wilson.

The minutes of the last two meetings were read and approved. H. Pape's fee bill of \$24.50 was ordered paid.

A full report of all the present vacant and unoccupied land belonging to the town, and of lots occupied and claimed, and assessed for expenses, and assessments unpaid, and no application made for title deeds, etc., was presented to the Board by the Recorder. The report was accepted, and on motion of Mr. Helms, the Town Attorney was directed to enforce the collection of unpaid assessments.

On motion of Mr. Linn, it was ordered that all the lots and vacant lands of the town be advertised for sale, and the Recorder to prepare a list with a description of the same, to be pasted up in town, offering all these lands for sale, application for purchase to be filed with the Recorder, etc.

Mr. Kahler, Town Attorney, being present, stated to the Board that upon examination in regard to licensing billiard tables, he was of the opinion that the Board had the authority to fix the rates of license, and, consequently, could reduce the present rates, if they saw fit. The matter was referred to the next meeting of the Board for further consideration.

Liquor licenses were granted to John Walters and John Noland.

A petition to purchase vacant town lots, was received from Peter Britz. Referred to a committee, consisting of Messrs. Linn, Helms, Wilson.

The meeting then adjourned.

OPERATION FOR CATARACT.—Yesterday Dr. Wilson, assisted by Dr. J. W. Van Den Bergh, performed an operation for cataract, on Mr. Goble, a citizen of St. Helens, who had not seen for several years out of that eye, previous to the operation. We are informed that the operation was successful in restoring the sight of the diseased eye, and there is good reason to believe that the cure is perfect and his sight be permanently benefited.—Salem Statesman.

SURGICAL OPERATION ON THE EYE.—Yesterday we witnessed an entropion operation by Dr. Chas. Wilson, on the eye of Mrs. J. B. Wright, who has been afflicted from childhood, and became nearly blind. Mrs. W. was obliged to keep the eyelashes pulled out; and the surgical operation was for the purpose of restoring the eyelid to its proper position. A portion of the eyelid, and muscle, about three-fourths of an inch long, and half an inch wide, was removed, and the edges of the wound sewed together. Dr. Wilson performed a similar operation on the other eye last Saturday which gave such satisfactory relief she determined to have both eyes operated upon. Dr. Wilson has cured many similar cases, and is confident that his patient will be restored to good sight.—Roseburg Ensign.
