The Democratic County Convention, for Jackson county, met at the Court House, in Jacksonville, on Thursday, May 9th, at 2 o'clock, p. m., and was called to order by James D. Fay, Chairman of the Central Committee.

On motion, J. N. T. Miller was elected temporary Chairman, and H. K. Hanna, temporary Secretary of the Convention. The Chairman appointed, as a Committee on Credentials, the following named gentlemen: Henry Klippel, Chas. Goodwin and W. F. Songer, who, after a brief absence, returned the following report:

All of which is respectfully submitted. HENRY KLIPPEL, Chairman. On motion, the report was accepted and Committee discharged; and on further motion, the report was adopted.

The Chairman now announced the election of permanent officers of the Convention in order, whereupon James D. Fay was elected President, H. K. Hanna, Secretary, and John Bolt, Assistant Secretary.

On motion, the President appointed a Committee of five, on Order of Business, composed of the following gentlemen: Wm. Griffin, A. S. Jacobs, A. Alford, M. W. Hale and Wm. Brotherton.

On motion, a Committee on Resolutions was now appointed, consisting of James N. T. Miller, Francis Plymale, Ben. Haymond, John Sizemore, W. F. Songer, Henry Klippel and A. M. Poe.

The Committee on Order of Business returned the following report, which was accepted and Committee discharged:

The undersigned Committee on Order of Business, would respectfully report the following as being the order of business, for the action of this Convention:

The nomination of three members of the House of Representatives, one County Judge, two County Commissioners, one Sheriff, one Clerk, one Treasurer, one School Superintendent, one Assessor, one Surveyor, one Coroner and seven members of the County Central Committee.

All of which we respectfully submit. (Signed) A. S. JACOBS, AL. ALFORD, M. W. HALE, W. BROTHERTON, W. M. GRIFFIN.

On motion, the report was adopted. The Committee on Resolutions, by their Chairman, returned the following, which, on motion, was accepted and Committee discharged; and on further motion the report was adopted:

Resolved, 1. That we declare our allegiance to the time-honored principles of the Democratic party, and we denounce and condemn any policy savored by the "New Departure," "Passiveism" or any affiliation with Radicalism, which is but another name for centralization, no matter by what name it is called or under what guise it is presented.

2. We declare that the Democratic party of the United States should place a sound Democratic Presidential ticket in the field, upon a sound Democratic platform.

3. The interests of the Southern portion of Oregon have been too long neglected, and the time has come when its development is imperatively demanded. While, therefore, we are in favor of the development of the commerce of the Columbia and Willamette rivers by any legitimate means, our Senators and Representatives are hereby instructed to support no man for U. S. Senator but a sound Democrat, and no Democrat but one who is pledged to use his best endeavors to secure all necessary Congressional legislation looking to the development of Southern Oregon.

4. We believe that a system of railroads, governed by just principles and intended for the public good, is necessary to the proper development of the State in general, and of this portion of it in particular; that the general government has already amply and liberally provided for the construction of the same, and we are opposed to any taxation of the people or State subsidies to aid in the construction of such railroads, and are equally opposed to unfriendly legislation against the same.

5. We are opposed to any construction of the Act entitled "An Act providing for the selection and sale of the swamp lands belonging to the State of Oregon," approved October 25th, 1870, which tends to deprive actual settlers of any rights which they may have in lands reported as swamp land, and our State Senator and Representatives are hereby instructed to use all honorable means to secure such rights to actual settlers.

6. We are in favor of an honest and economical administration of the State and county governments.

7. We declare that the land system of this State should be reformed, in order that the rights of actual settlers be protected against land monopolists. We declare further, that the mining lands, which have been selected as school lands, should be secured to the miner, who has spent years of toil in developing them, and that the sale of such lands to capitalists and monopolists is an outrage which the next Legislature should remedy.

The following nominations were made by the Convention: For Representatives, E. C. Mason, Henry Klippel, L. D. Wade; County Judge, John M. Black; County Commissioners, John O'Brien, Thomas Wright, Sheriff, J. S. Miller; Clerk, S. J. Day; Treasurer, Kaspar Kubli; School Superintendent, J. B. Farley; Assessor, Wm. Gregory; Surveyor, G. H. Lynch; Coroner, L. T. Davis.

On motion, the Convention proceeded to elect a Central Committee, whereupon the following gentlemen were elected: John S. Herrin, Wm. Simpson, Henry

Klippel, B. F. Wade, J. N. T. Miller, J. D. Fay, Thos. Beal.

On motion, J. D. Fay was declared Chairman of the above Committee. Capt. Alcorn offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That we endorse the DEMOCRATIC TIMES as the Democratic organ of this county. The resolution was adopted by the Convention, with one dissenting vote.

On motion, it was resolved that the proceedings of this Convention be published in the DEMOCRATIC TIMES. On motion, the Convention adjourned. JAMES D. FAY, Pres't. H. K. HANNA, JOHN BOLT, Secretaries.

AN ERROR.—Judge Williams asserted in his speech to the serenaders that Horace Greeley said that if the Democracy nominated a ticket, he would immediately go over to the support of Grant.

After a careful perusal of the proceedings of the Cincinnati Convention, we confess our inability to see the truth of Judge Williams' assertions with these specs. The whole tenor of the speeches and proceedings indicate that the movement was understood to be confined to the Republican party, without any reference whatever to the Democracy.

The temporary Chairman, Judge Mathews, struck the key-note in his speech opening the Convention. He declared the movement of the Liberals a rebellion in the ranks of the Radical party. Senator Carl Schurz, on taking the Chair as the permanent Chairman of the Convention, followed in the same strain. There was not the remotest allusion to the Democratic party in any of the speeches or proceedings, nor any act which indicated an expectation of Democratic support. And so far as Horace Greeley himself is concerned, he committed himself without reservation or qualification to the Cincinnati movement in a speech made at Cooper's Institute, New York, at the great mass meeting of Liberal Republicans held recently, which meeting was also addressed by Senators Trumbull and Schurz. If Greeley intended that his support of the Cincinnati movement should depend upon the contingency of Democratic support, the speech at that meeting was the proper and appropriate place for him to have declared the qualifications and reservations under which he supported the Liberal movement. The unqualified manner in which he endorsed the movement on that occasion, is of infinitely more significance than the declaration of Judge Williams' to the contrary.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.—The Jackson County Agricultural Society held their annual meeting at the Court House in Jacksonville, May 4th, 1872.

The President, J. D. Fay, called the meeting to order; whereupon Major Glenn offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That this meeting elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, to serve until the last day of the next Annual Fair of this Society.

The President having announced the election of officers in order, the following named gentlemen were duly elected to their respective offices, viz:

President, John S. Herrin; Vice-Presidents, John Grievies and Conrad Mingus; Secretary, H. K. Hanna; Treasurer, J. T. Glenn; Trustees for one year, Henry Brown, Enoch Walker, Jas. McDonough and John Watson; Trustees for two years, Thomas Wright, J. B. Wisley, John Sizemore and J. A. Panky; Trustees for three years, N. C. Dean, J. N. T. Miller, Thos. Beal and Francis Plymale.

The following resolution was now offered and adopted:

Resolved, That the President hereafter appoint a committee of three to revise the Constitution and By-Laws, and submit the same for ratification to a meeting of this Society, to be hereafter called by the President.

On motion, the meeting now adjourned sine die. J. D. FAY, Pres't. H. K. HANNA, Sec'y.

LEASE OF COUNTY ROAD.

IN accordance with an order of the County Court of the State of Oregon, for Jackson county, made at the May term thereof, A. D., 1872, sealed proposals will be received at the Clerk's office, in said county, until Tuesday at 2 o'clock, p. m., the 4th day of June, A. D., 1872, for the lease of so much of the county road, running from Hill farm to Lost river, as is embraced between the following points: Commencing at the 4-mile post and terminating at the 45-mile post—a distance of 41 miles; to be leased to any person or corporation to open, improve and keep the same in good repair for travel thereon for a period of ten years, with the right, in consideration thereof, to collect tolls at one gate for travel thereon, the road in no place to be less than 12 feet wide, where graded, and the ascent or descent of the road in no place to be greater than 1 foot in 8; to be constructed in a good, substantial manner, with convenient turn-outs for the passage of teams, the turn-outs on the grades to be not less than 16 feet in width, rocks and other obstructions to be removed, and swamps to be thrown up or bridged, and the road to be kept open and in condition for travel thereon at all seasons of the year, except as it may be obstructed by the snow. The bid shall specify the unit or rate of toll upon a sheep or hog which the bidder is willing to accept for keeping the road, and such bid shall be deemed a bid for tolls as to the other items mentioned in Section 64, in proportion to such unit or rate as specified in Section 65, of Chapter 47, Title 3, General Laws of Oregon. No bids will be considered unless accompanied by an undertaking executed by two or more sufficient sureties in the sum of two thousand dollars, to be void upon the condition that the bidder, if the lease is awarded to him, will, within ten days thereafter, or such further time as the Court may allow, enter into a contract for keeping the road, and give the necessary undertaking for the faithful performance of the contract. The sealed bids will be opened at the Court House in said county, on the said fourth day of June, and if deemed expedient, the lease will be awarded to the lowest bidder, having due reference to the fact which of them is best qualified for the undertaking. OPERATION FOR CATARACT.—Yesterday Dr. Wilson, assisted by Dr. J. W. SURGICAL OPERATION ON THE EYE.—Yesterday we witnessed an entropion operation by Dr. Chas. Wilson, on the eye of Mrs. J. B. Wright, who has been afflicted from childhood, and became nearly blind. Mrs. W. was obliged to keep the eyelashes pulled out; and the surgical operation was for the purpose of restoring the eyelid to its proper position. A portion of the eyelid, and muscle, about three-fourths of an inch long, and half an inch wide, was removed, and the edges of the wound sewed together. Dr. Wilson performed a similar operation on the other eye last Saturday which gave such satisfactory relief she determined to have both eyes operated upon. Dr. Wilson has cured many similar cases, and is confident that his patient will be restored to good sight.—Roseburg Ensign.
