FLAX.—Wild flax, which looks like it might be tamed, has been found in the Klamath Lake country.

RELIGIOUS.—Rev. Father Blanchett will hold divine service at the Catholic Church to-morrow, (Sunday) at the usual hour.

NEW GRIST MILL.—Mr. John Dailey is building a first-class new grist mill on Butte Creek, which will be of great benefit to that section of the county.

SENTENCED.—James Barclay, convicted by the U. S. District Court at Portland for introducing liquor at Fort Klamath, was sentenced to one year's imprisonment.

CROPS INJURED.—George Mercer, of Corvallis, who has just finished his contract of surveying the Klamath Indian Agency, reports that severe frosts have injured the crops in that region.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.—At the meeting of the Board of Equalization, held last week, the taxes were raised on fourteen persons to the amount of \$29,550. No further business was transacted.

BIG HAUL.—The party of Jacksonville hoodlums, who went a fishing to Rogue river with giant powder last Sunday, captured eighty odd suckers with a few blunts, and it wasn't a good day for fish either.

RAIN.—A heavy rain fell several days of this week, extinguishing the heavy fires raging in the mountains, and having the desirable effect of greatly improving the health of this community, which has not been the best of late.

ITS EFFECT.—The edict issued by the District Attorney in last week's local papers, had some effect in closing the saloons and stores last Sunday.

COUNTY COURT.—The County Court, after an unimportant session of two days, adjourned to meet again on the 21st inst.
