PENNSYLVANIA.
As each day passes by, revelations are made which plainly show the damning frauds by which the State of Pennsylvania was carried. Thousands upon thousands of negroes—poor ignorant human cattle—were shipped into the city of Philadelphia, and unblushingly voted for Hartraut and his band of thieves.

Indeed, outside of one or two cities, the State of Pennsylvania is largely Democratic; but bribery, fraud, wholesale pardoning of convicts, and swarms of imported negroes, carried the State against the intelligence and wealth of that noble old commonwealth. Unless the people of America awake to a sense of the danger with which they are compassed, but few years will elapse before a half dozen cities of the Union will rule the Republic as absolutely as ever corrupt and profligate Paris ruled the destiny of sunny France. The enfranchisement of the negroes, says the *Mercury*, has furnished a powerful element of corruption, and we are being taught how potent it is in the hands of designing and bad men.

By running these poor creatures into the metropolis of any State in the Union, the will of the people can be thwarted, and their rights and liberties placed in the hands of men compared to whom the fiendish Communes were angels. Let honest men pause, before it is too late.

\$399,000,000.—That is all; only three hundred and ninety-nine millions of dollars have been stolen from the people during Grant's administration. Mr. Garfield (Republican) says the pension frauds amount to \$8,000,000 annually, making in three years \$24,000,000. The report of the Civil Service Commission says that the revenue lost by smuggling and frauds amounts to one-fourth of the whole. The average annual revenues are \$500,000,000—stealings one-fourth, \$125,000,000, annually, making in three years \$375,000,000, and swelling the amount to \$399,000,000 in three years.

Should the same system and management continue for the remaining year, it will swell the stealings and cribbings of the four years of Grant's administration to the small sum of five hundred and thirty-two millions of dollars (\$532,000,000). Tax-payers are a patient people—but they are loyal men—such as Cameron, Murphy, Leet, &c.

A CONTRAST.—Horace Greeley is a candidate for the Presidency of the United States, and with every possibility of success before him. Notwithstanding the fact that he is almost continually surrounded with friends when in New York or when in fact, he does not hide himself away, he still finds time to prepare able agricultural addresses, and to assist a friend in the preparation of the forthcoming cyclopedia. In the meantime what is Grant doing? Go to Long Branch and see. Surrounded with such men as Tom Murphy, he hopes away the day in profitless talk about fast horses, in smoking cigars, drinking, and driving out, seated behind a liveried coachman. What would be thought of the society, agricultural or otherwise, that would invite him to address them; and, if so invited and he should accept, what would be the character of the address?

CAMPAIGN NOTES.
Grant has accepted gifts, and rewarded the givers with office.
The Republican papers are the only organs the Louisville Conventionists have.

Shameless and unblushing frauds were practiced in Pennsylvania by the Grant-ites.
Indiana elected, on the 8th inst., her first Democratic Governor for many years.
Grant has ostracised every public man who had the independence and the manliness to differ from him.

The actual increase in the circulation of the New York *Tribune* since it abolished Grant in 1871, amounts to 44,000 copies.
Grant has set himself up for a second term in an office which he must know, and which he half confesses, that he is unqualified for.

Grant has upheld the infamous carpet-bagging rule in the Southern States, and thereby impoverished the white people of that section.
Grant has employed the army to do the work of constable, and has suspended the writ of *habeas corpus* in time of profound peace.

Grant has tampered with the independence and integrity of Congress, by personally soliciting members to his San Domingo scheme.
Every day adds friends in Oregon to the Greeley and Brown cause. Let every patriot do his duty and Oregon is sure for the right.

Grant has shamefully abused the appointing power, by selecting for his cabinet the commonest of men, whose names—spelt by the unlettered muse—had else remained unknown.
Four years ago Hamilton county, Ohio, in which Cincinnati is located, gave Grant 6,000 majority. At the election on the 9th instant it gave 4,000 majority for the Liberal ticket.

A PROFIT FOR THE PRESIDENT.—As a good deal has been said, and we think, improperly said, about alleged indecorous methods employed by President Grant to improve his personal fortunes, it may not be amiss to allude to one method that was effectual, and has never been called indecorous. Just about the time he became President, certain friends in New York made him a present of \$105,000 United States bonds. These bonds at that time were payable in lawful money—greenbacks—and were worth about \$3 per cent. in gold, it then being 135. The President recommended to Congress the passage of law guaranteeing the payment of all United States bonds, including the \$105,000 held by himself, in gold. Congress did as he advised. It passed an act pledging the faith of the government to pay in gold some sixteen hundred million five-twenty bonds, which, by the law of their issue, were payable in lawful currency. The consequence of this legislation is that the President's \$105,000 bonds, which were worth \$3 in gold in 1869, are now worth 95; so that the measure recommended by the President added \$12,000 to his fortune.

MONEY ORDERS.—The money order system between the United States and the German empire went into operation on Tuesday, October 1st. The maximum of each order is fixed when issued in United States at fifty dollars in currency, and the rates of commission as follows: For any sum not exceeding five dollars—five cents; for above five dollars, but not exceeding ten dollars—twenty-five cents; for above ten dollars, but not exceeding twenty dollars—fifty cents; for above twenty dollars, but not exceeding thirty dollars—seventy-five cents; for above thirty dollars, but not exceeding forty dollars, one dollar; for above forty dollars, but not exceeding fifty dollars—one dollar and twenty-five cents.

"How can you support Horace Greeley, the life-long opponent of the Democratic party?" was the question propounded to a Democratic voter by a supporter of the great nepotist. The Democrat replied:
"Do you consider Greeley honest?"
"Oh, yes," answered the other. "Do you regard him as capable?"
"Certainly," answered the Grant man. "Well, then, said the Democratic supporter of Horace, 'If you could vote in 1868 for a drunken and incompetent Democrat, I think I can vote in 1872 for a sober, honest and capable Republican.'" The Grant man subsided.

WHERE THE MONEY GOES.—Some idea of the enormous drain upon the specie of the country may be gained from a recent statement, telegraphed from San Francisco, that "twenty-six and three-quarter millions in treasure had been shipped to China and Japan this year." And yet this immense flow of the precious metals has been going on for years and will continue perhaps for years to come. The Orient is like that sea which engulfs all, but gives nothing back it has swallowed.

THE levies being made upon Government employees for campaign expenses nearly amounts to robbery, and has forced scores of them into dishonest practices to save themselves from want. Such a system is abhorrent to every dictate of honesty, yet it very clearly exemplifies Grant's sort of "Civil Service Reform."

OREGON.
The State University is to be located at Eugene City.
The cars made their first appearance in Roseburg on the 20th inst.

The City Government for Roseburg, under the new charter, took effect last Saturday.
William Nixon, of Yaquina, has a half interest in a six months' baby, which weighs 96 pounds.

The white section hands along the line of the O. & C. R. R. have been discharged and Chinamen hired in their places.
Some scoundrel has been Kukluxing the dogs and cats of Albany. Large numbers of these animals have been poisoned lately.

The winged calf, exhibited at the State Fair, has been purchased for the San Francisco Circus, and will undoubtedly be exhibited by that circus in Jacksonville next Saturday.
A jealous China woman of Union county, recently caught her "feller's" paramour, beat her, saturated her with kerosene and set her on fire. The paramour is dead and the other one is in jail.

The *Bulletin* says: Hon. James K. Kelly, United States Senator from Oregon, is getting ready for his return to Washington, and making his arrangements accordingly. He expects to leave in about two weeks.
The Commissioner of the General Land Office has decided that coal lands are mineral lands, and are subject to sale as such. This decision was made on an appeal taken by some parties wishing coal lands on tracts claimed under the land grant of the Coos Bay Wagon Road.

A California paper has just made a discovery. It says: "Oregon will soon be added to the list of wool-growing States. Some enterprising farmers have purchased choice merino sheep, and it is said that some of the very best and purest blooded animals in the world are to be found in that State."

The *Statesman* says: Probably as large a kiln of brick as was ever burned on the coast is at present being burned at the penitentiary. It was fired Sunday morning, and consists of seventy-two arches, and contains the enormous sum of 1,100,000 brick. This little pile will prove no small item in the erection of our new State house, for which purpose some of them will probably be used.

A dispatch from Grave creek, Jackson county, gives the following: At half past three o'clock to-day, the stage bound north, upset about two miles north of Grant's Pass, Jackson county, Oregon, going down what is known as Louse Creek hill near the residence of William Kahler. The stage was full of passengers, one of whom, a Mr. McCrum, was seriously if not fatally injured. The injured man was taken to the house of Mr. Kahler. Every care that could be bestowed on him. It seems that owing to the sickness of Mr. Hyde, the regular driver, the hostler at Grant's Pass undertook to drive through with the above result. Three of the passengers and the driver returned to the station, where a new outfit was procured, and Mr. Tucker, the driver from the other route, proceeded to the scene of the accident and took the mail and passengers on. A physician was telegraphed for from Grave Creek to attend the injured man. No other passengers were severely injured.

W. CULLEN Gaston, says the *Benton Democrat*, publishes a legal opinion to the effect that a paper designated by the Governor as the official medium through which all legal notices shall appear, under the litigant act, holds a franchise that extends at least to the close of the Governor's term of office, and that no act of the Legislature can invalidate such appointment until that time. This opinion is sustained by the best legal authorities extant.

THE Presidential election does not as is popularly supposed take place in all the States on the same day. In Louisiana it occurs on the 4th of November and in Texas on the 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th of November, both of these elections being under special acts of Congress. In all the other States the election is held on the 5th of November.
