GRAND JURORS.—J. N. T. Miller, E. Jones, John A. Boyer, Thos. H. Moreland, John Head, Geo. W. Isaacs and Fred. Lay were the Grand Jurors for the present term of the Circuit Court.

THE ELECTION.—Returns from nearly all the precincts in the county indicate that Greeley has about 70 majority. The total vote cast is about 1,100—over four hundred less than cast at the June election.

TERMS OF CIRCUIT COURT.—By an act passed by the last Legislature, the time for holding Circuit Court in Jackson county has been placed on the second Monday of February, June and November, and in Josephine on the fourth Monday in October.

GOOSE LAKE.—Returns from Goose Lake give the number of votes cast for Greeley at 41, and 19 for Grant. This is a Democratic gain of 8 on the June election, and a Radical loss of 11. Had the other precincts done as well as Goose Lake, Greeley's majority would have been over 300.

THE WEATHER.—A heavy rain fell this week, causing the roads to become extremely rough and raising the creeks considerably. After raging several hours, it ceased, and a very heavy frost fell, rendering the weather bitterly cold. The indications are that we will be blessed with a hard winter.

NEW MAIL ROUTE.—There is in contemplation a new mail route from Jacksonville to Sam's Valley, Butte Creek, and Manzanita, to take the place of the present one, which will accommodate more people and to better advantage, and steps are being taken to push the matter through. The contemplated route begins at Jacksonville, runs from there to Brownsborough, thence to Big Butte, thence to Hannah's ferry, from there to the Meadows on Evans' Creek, from the Meadows to Hays' store in Sam's Valley, and from there to Jacksonville, by way of Bybee's Ferry and Manzanita. The citizens living on the above line are requested to call on Deputy Sheriff Coats, at the Sheriff's office, and give him the names of the various post-masters and post-offices they desire to have appointed and established. Mr. Coats has a blank diagram to be filled out, and sent on to Washington, and those interested should not hesitate or delay in this matter, but take action immediately.
