An Immence Snow-Plow.

General F. A. Walker, Superintendent of the Census Bureau, recommends that Congress should pass a law enabling the Bureau to take a National census in 1875, to be completed by June, 1876, so as to exhibit the statistical condition of the United States on the Hundredth Anniversary of our existence as a nation. The information that could be acquired respecting our agricultural, manufacturing, commercial, and educational interests, would be well worth the appropriation required to obtain it. The census of 1870 was taken in many of the States before industry and tranquility were sufficiently re-established to permit a proper appreciation of our National resources. If General Walker's recommendations receive attention from Congress, the proposed census made, under a proper scientific 'irection, would be a work corps is still engaged fn tabulating the results obtained in 1270 and one of the greatest difficulties of the undertaking would be almost overcome by having skilled assistants to aid in the prosecution of the suggested work.

Gen. Walker considers that a census taken at decennial periods is at intervals sult is to enable Congress to arrange the representation to which each State is entitled in the House. Many of the States are required by their Constitutions to make an enumeration of their inhabitants at certain periods. In some that provision is disregarded. Although the Constitution of California contains such an Article, it has not been acted upon since 1852; and, if ordered, the Legislaprove of little value except to re-district the State.
