The Law of Newspapers.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.
2. If any subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the offices to which they are directed, the law holds them responsible until they have settled the bills, and order them discontinued.
4. If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publisher, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.
5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from the office, or removing and leaving them uncollected for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
6. The postmaster who neglects to give legal notice of the neglect of a person to take from the office the newspaper addressed to him, is liable to the publisher for the subscription price.

STATE OF OREGON,
EXECUTIVE OFFICE,
SALEM, August 14th, 1872.

WHEREAS, by virtue of an Act of the Legisla-
tive Assembly of the State of Oregon, enti-
tled, "An Act to protect litigants," approved Oc-
tober 25th, 1870, it is made the duty of the Gov-
ernor of said State to designate by order filed with
the Secretary of State, one newspaper for every
county within this State, in which shall be pub-
lished all judicial and legal advertisements con-
cerning said county.

Now, in pursuance of said law, it is hereby or-
dered that the DEMOCRATIC TIMES, published at
Jacksonville, Jackson county, Oregon, be and the
same is hereby designated as the newspaper in

aforesaid for the county of Jackson, in said State.
