Town and County.

PERSONAL.—Hon. James D. Fay returned from Portland last Saturday.

THANKS.—Hon. James K. Kelly and Hon. James H. Slater have our thanks for favors.

CATHOLIC CHURCH.—Rev. Father Blanchett will hold divine services at the Catholic Church to-morrow (Sunday) at the usual hour.

DISCHARGED.—The volunteers this week received their scrip and discharges, and a majority of them have left for their respective homes.

FIRE.—A slight fire occurred in Ashland yesterday. But little damage done, though it was rumored that the town had been burned down.

CIRCUIT COURT.—The regular February term of the Circuit Court, Judge Prim, presiding, commences next Monday, 10th inst. Several new cases appear on the docket.

REMOVAL.—Orth & Gianni have removed their butcher-shop to Orth's new brick building on Oregon Street, where they are prepared to serve their customers with best of meats.

APPOINTMENTS.—Governor Grover has appointed Jesse N. Barker, of Douglas county, as Quartermaster of the Oregon Militia, and Quincy A. Brooks, of this county, as Assistant Quartermaster.

FOR MARSHAL.—In another column will be found the announcement of Jacob Roudabush, as a candidate for the office of City Marshal. Mr. Roudabush will make an excellent officer, if elected.

THE PEACE COMMISSION.—It is rumored that Capt. Jack, Scar-faced Charley, Sam. Colver, Elijah Steale or Shuck Nasty Jim will be appointed on the Peace Commission to reconcile the whites to being scalped ad libitum.

REMOVAL.—There is a rumor afloat that Fairchild has been scalped by the Modocs. If this is actually so, then the scalp of some prominent Modoc ty-coon, say Captain Jack, Scar-faced Charley, or Shuck Nasty Jim, and all of their white sympathizers, should be taken as a just recompense.

MORE TROOPS FOR THE FRONT.—Capt. Miller with a detachment of his company of artillery, numbering some fifty-four men, passed through this place last Tuesday. They came from Fort Stevens, Oregon, and are en route to join Gen. Gillen on Lost River. They also went as an escort for several teams loaded with supplies for the troops.

LARCENY.—Two hombres named Wm. Smith and Frederick Barnhart were last week brought from Linkville, charged with larceny, and lodged in jail. It appears that while in an intoxicated state they broke into Brentano & Blair's saloon, and took therefrom some benzine, a revolver and some money. They were arrested and had an examination before Justice Stephenson, and held to bail in the sum of \$300 each, in default of which they were sent to limbo to await the action of the Grand Jury.

ONE OF A JACK'S SCHEMES.—Capt. Jack, who has an insatiable weakness for scalps, no doubt wetted his blade for Capt. John Fairchild's eranium, when he sent a squaw as messenger to Fairchild's camp, informing him that he wished to have a talk with him and smoke the calumet of peace. Acting in good faith, Fairchild, Dorris and a few others accompanied the squaw sent out to the top of the high bluff, a few miles from Jack's position. They refused, however, to proceed any further, as the invitation from Jack to interview him only in the Lava Bed made it quite evident that Jack was looking out for additional ornaments for his scalp-pole, and Fairchild and party returned to their camp. Capt. Fairchild took a very active part in the late great battle, and Jack would be only too happy to "raise his hair."

IN TOWN.—Capt. O. C. Applegate is in town on business connected with the discharge of his men. His boys—both whites and Indians—some of the latter being Modocs from Yanax, fought as coolly as veterans in the fearful battle of the Lava Beds. In describing the battle ground he says he is satisfied that an army of 2,000 men could be so well concealed in the caves and crevices over which the troops fought that day that another army might be marched over them without being aware of their whereabouts. He is commissary for 100 Modocs and 400 Snakes at Yanax, and says he feels confident that with careful management things will go well there, if the Modocs under Capt. Jack are severely chastised and the murderers are executed. A compromise would demoralize all the Indians on reservations.

ITEMS.

INDIAN APPROPRIATION.—The Indian Appropriation Bill contains an indisputable item of \$50,000 for the subsistence of the Snake and Pit River Indians on the Malheur Reservation in South-eastern Oregon.

Jerry Crooks, one of Fairchild's men who were wounded in the late battle, has died of his wounds. The New York Herald has sent a correspondent to the front.
