THE INDIANS TO BE INDICTED BY THE GRAND JURY.—The Grand Jury is still in session, awaiting the arrival of Mrs. Boldy and other witnesses from the Lake Country, whose testimony will be taken as evidence against the Indians engaged in the late massacre, and who will probably be indicted and held accountable for their conduct.

NOT REMOVED.—An article to the effect that Gen. Wheaton has been removed from the command of the troops in the Lake country has been going the rounds of the press. This is incorrect. Gen. Wheaton has only been relieved from the command of the troops operating against the Moslems by Col. Gillem, and still has command of the Departments of the Lakes.

PERSONAL.—E. Steele, Esq., of Yreka, is in town, in attendance on the Circuit Court.

Hon. P. P. Prim returned from Salem last Saturday.

S. Chase, Esq., of the Alsea Indian Agency, one of the Indian Peace Commissioners, arrived here last Monday and proceeded next day for Linkville, the point designated for the first meeting of the Commissioners. Also Gen. Canby.

HOSTILITIES SUSPENDED.—Orders have been issued from Washington to Gen. Gillem, in command of the troops operating against the Moslems, to suspend hostilities and make such disposition of his troops as will protect the settlers and their property, and await the action of the Peace Commissioners, which meet at Linkville to-day. Hostilities will no doubt be inaugurated soon again, as it is not probable that Jack and the Commissioners will come to satisfactory terms.

FOR LINKVILLE.—H. H. Gilfrey, Esq., Private Secretary to Governor Grover, passed through this place last Wednesday, en route for Linkville. Mr. Gilfrey, besides being bearer of important dispatches to Gen. Canby and the Indian Peace Commissioners, will, whilst at the Linkville Land Office, attend to the proper listing of the 90,000 acres of Agricultural College lands belonging to this State, the same being located within the district of lands subject to sale at that office.

THE PEACE COMMISSION.—The Peace Commission which consists of Jesse Applegate, S. Case and A. B. Meacham, meets at Linkville to-day. The object of the Commission is, we presume, to secure peace, but upon what terms, if secured at all, remains to be seen. This war having been inaugurated, not by the U. S. troops, but by the Indians themselves, and the U. S. Government not being as yet "cleared out" by the hostiles, the propriety of our being in such haste to sue for peace at the hands of those red-handed murderers is not perceived. The action of the Commissioners will of course depend in a great measure upon the character of their instructions and upon the disposition manifested by Capt. Jack and his followers. We can see no particular good that is to come from the labors of this Commission, and will be gratified if it produces no harm.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Board of Trustees held a special meeting last Monday, February 10th. A full Board was present. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The report of the Committee on the application of G. Karewski, made at the last meeting, was taken up and read. The Committee recommended that the premises applied for be assessed and a deed granted to the applicants, providing, however, that all the rights, privileges and uses of John Orth therein be reserved, and on motion the lot was assessed for expenses against the same in the sum of \$10. It was thereupon ordered that such a deed be executed to H. Goldsmith and the heirs of H. Lauer.

The Committee appointed to have a base line run for town surveys and established, reported the work done, and submitted the Surveyor's notes and bill of expenses for the work—\$23. An ordinance establishing said base line and initial point was also reported by the Committee. The report was adopted and the Committee discharged, and the ordinance submitted taken up and passed.

The Committee on the application of Mrs. S. E. Overbeck not being ready to report were granted further time. A report was received from the Fire Wardens, which was read and ordered filed.

It was ordered that a warrant be drawn in favor of J. S. Howard for the sum of \$23, for surveyor's services and expenses as reported.

The following bills against the town were presented: TIMES office, publishing act to amend town charter, \$10; Sentinel office, bill for the same, \$10, with other claims for \$13—a total of \$23. Referred to the Finance Committee.

The order for the sale of lots Nos. 2 and 3, block No. 55, to G. H. Young, passed at the last meeting, was revoked. An order was passed, offering lots Nos. 2 and 3, block No. 55, for sale to Geo. H. Young for \$15, coin, and all expenses of conveyance to be paid by purchaser.

An order was made for the annual election for town officers, to be held on the 4th day of March next, and legal public notice to be given by posting notices at least ten days before election day. Silas J. Day, James R. Neil and Edwin Smith were appointed inspectors of the election, and Max Muller and John Boyer, Clerks.
