DESCRIPTION OF THE LAVA BEDS.

The following extract from a letter written by Jesse Applegate and published in the Bulletin, will give an idea of the difficulties to be encountered in fighting the Modocs:

If you can, imagine a smooth, solid sheet of granite, ten miles square, and 500 feet thick, covering resistless mines of gunpowder, scattered at irregular intervals under it; that these mines are exploded simultaneously, rending the whole field into rectangular masses, from the size of a match-box to that of a church, heaping these masses high in some places, and leaving deep chasms in others.
